Prelude

D. Buxtehude

Dietrich Buxtehude (c. 1637-1707) was the greatest German church composer in the generation before J. S. Bach—and the only teacher Bach had, beyond his own family. He spent most of his famous life in Lübeck.

Children's Moment

Epiphany is the conclusion of Christmas. Just as we read an account of Jesus' birth in Luke, and learn of the shepherds gathered at the manger around the holy family, we now read Matthew's story of the Magi, these mysterious visitors from the East, come to bring precious gifts to the Christ-child. More important, they offer a witness grounded in a desire to know more: about the God of Israel, about the wondrous things he is doing, about the miraculous baby who has come into their world—and who comes into ours, too. Scripture Lesson

Matthew 2:1-12. In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, ²asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." ³When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; ⁴and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. ⁵They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet: ⁶'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel."

⁷Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. ⁸Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." ⁹When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. ¹⁰When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. ¹¹On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. ¹²And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.
