Micah 6:1-8. Hear what the Lord says: Rise, plead your case before the mountains, and let the hills hear your voice. ²Hear, you mountains, the controversy of the Lord, and you enduring foundations of the earth; for the Lord has a controversy with his people, and he will contend with Israel.

³"O my people, what have I done to you? In what have I wearied you? 
- **1.** To hear the reports of all officers, committees, and organizations, as required under the CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS of the church.

- **3.** To consider and act upon any other matters relating to the general church welfare that may properly come before this meeting.


