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The Pastoral Perspective

Jesus Christ is risen. He is risen indeed!

This is the traditional proclamation shared by Christians.

However, it begs the logical question: "What next?"

Sure, it's great to learn about the Resurrection. It's wonderful to know that Jesus has returned, that God has kept his promise, and, as we will learn on Pentecost Sunday in a few weeks, that the Holy Spirit is abroad in the world.

"But my bills have to be paid. My loved one is gone. Work is hard. My relationship is strained." These are all things we may have to deal with. And even if everything is just fine at home, we look at the proverbial Big Picture, and we don't know what to do. Politics is a mess. The climate is endangered. The list goes on.

We're left wondering what difference the resurrection of Jesus will make in our lives.

My answer is that the resurrection of Jesus makes all the difference in the world. My belief is grounded in hope, and that's what God wants us to do. Not to believe in pie-in-the-sky dreams, but to have hope, to yearn for a better world, to be confident we are not alone.

True, things may not work out for us some of the time. For some of us, things never seem to work out. But my prayer is that we will all still have hope and our faith in God will remain steadfast. The Gospel is meant to carry us through the worst of times. And as I say this, I recall that the early Christians were isolated, marginalized, often ostracized. They were, to the rest of society at least, losers.

Yet these so-called losers persisted, their religion caught on, and today Christianity is the largest faith in the world, present in most every country. I think that humility is in order. The Church has not spread because of our diligence, but because of what it has taught and how its adherents have brought their faith to the community.

People throughout the Upper Valley know about FCC Lebanon because of our Open Door Ministry and the musical performances and other

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NEWS AND NOTES

DIACONATE

Linda Gerlach opened the March Diaconate meeting with a reading on tolerance and understanding. The Deacons addressed several congregational care needs as well, primarily the Hammonds and Sargents.

A couple Deacons have investigated a web-based church membership directory, to which congregation members would upload contact information and photos, which could be updated as needed. Deb Scott and Stacey Steele will follow up with Rev. Steve Silver.

Dawn Troutman proposed a series of member recruitment strategies, to reach out beyond our Sanctuary and worship services. Possible settings include activities on the front lawn, an FCC contingent at community or service events (e.g., Habitat for Humanity), delivery of meals to residential contexts (e.g., Dismas House), making contact with neighboring institutions such as Headrest, Rogers House, Lebanon Towers, and schools. Sue Pratt will assist in developing ideas. Within the church, the Deacons discussed updating pew welcome brochures and offering non-worship gatherings





such as trivia nights. The Deacons will develop these ideas further for discussion with Council.

Rev. Silver noted minimal FCC participation in the ecumenical Ash Wednesday service at the United Methodist Church. He asked for help in promoting such joint events, including the Easter sunrise service in Colburn Park.

OUR LOCAL MISSION

Our Open Door Ministry Supporting Our Community, One Gift Card at a Time

Throughout the year our neighbors come to the church office seeking assistance. Whether it's a tank of gas, food for dinner, or payment toward rent or utility bills, our congregation offers help through the **OPEN DOOR MINISTRY**. Available to anyone in Lebanon and nearby towns, this ministry is one of the most vital services we extend to our community, especially beyond the challenges of the pandemic.

We don't ask for proof of need; the "Open" Door is just that. We do ask recipients to wait at least four months between requests, just to ensure fairer distribution. FCC has responded to these needs for years, but we *never* have enough to assist everyone–**demand has increased considerably, and we now have helped almost 600 people.**



Those who come to us aren't irresponsible or lazy, and most (about 75%) request help just once or twice, rather than becoming dependent on the program. Some are chronically unhoused; some have just been evicted or moved to the area. Some have just lost a job or started a new one. Some are driving more to care for an ill family member; some are referred to us by a counselor at LISTEN or WISE. **All are our neighbors.**





The Open Door is kept open by your contributions, including monthly communion offerings, supplemented by the Mission and Social Action Fund (from the Dole Trust). We distribute \$25 gift cards for gas and food (purchased from Jake's Market and Price Chopper, respectively), and we write checks in modest amounts for rent and utilities. In every case, our ability to help those in need depends on you, our congregation. And because of you, we can serve a lot of people—your neighbors thank you!

Dismas of Vermont

HARTFORD DISMAS HOUSE is part of a network that assists recently incarcerated women and men as they return and readjust to life outside of prison. Located on Maple Street in Hartford, the house offers residents a safe environment while they develop skills, daily habits, and



relationships to facilitate their transition—"reconciling prisoners to society, and society to prisoners."

DAVID'S HOUSE is the dream of a boy named David Cyr, who died in 1984 after a struggle with leukemia. During hospital treatments in Hanover, David and his father Dick met families who were determined not to leave their sick children but had nowhere to stay locally and could not afford a hotel. Soon after David's passing, his parents and friends established David's House, which in 37 years has welcomed over 16,000 families from around the world, while their kids get the care they need at DHMC next door.
