




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## The Pastoral Perspective

Fifty years ago this past July, Lyndon Johnson signed the Civil Rights Act into law, bringing our nation that much closer to fulfilling the promise of equality for of all its citizens. At the center of this long struggle stood the Christian church. While not every layperson or clergy member was on the side of right, there is no doubt that the witness and work of those who fought and worked for change proved pivotal to the passage of this landmark legislation.

Recalling these events of a half-century ago, names like Martin Luther King, Jr. and James Abernathy may come to immediately come to mind. That is not surprising. But we should not forget the less prominent amongst the faithful, those whose names are not recorded in history books, whether black or white, Southerner or Northerner—those who recognized in the fight for Civil Rights the imperative that if Scripture is to be taken seriously, it can't be confined to the four walls of a sanctuary or to a Bible study class. Instead, it must shape one's actions, priorities, and indeed lives. These modern saints knew that those who claim to follow the way of Jesus are asked to consider what texts like Micah 6:8 (He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?) and Galatians 3:28 (There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus.) demanded of them.

What was true in 1964 remains true in 2014. While the issues that engage our attention have changed (and some have not), the call to let the Gospel guide our choices is as powerful and compelling today as it has ever been.

But what does this mean for us in the First Congregational Church of Lebanon, which is a member of the United Church of Christ? Our polity holds that although we are in covenant with others, no body can officially represent our stance on a particular matter. While

### COMMITTEE NOTES

### **BOARD OF GOVERNORS**

The Board of Governors is not meeting in July or August but continues to keep an eye on a few ongoing and new projects. The largest of these was the east-side exterior painting, which has just been completed with excellent results (see photos on this page).

Unfortunately, in the course of the painting job, an extensive amount of rotten wood was found around the lower side door, the result of poor drainage and drying in that corner in all seasons. The Board has asked Don Collins' crew to repair and replace the rot, funding for which was approved by Church Council in an email discussion.

Don's crew also investigated an ongoing issue of moisture seeping into the walls and foundation along the access ramp on that side of the building. (Water blisters can be seen underneath the paint on the downstairs classroom walls.) Don's men will correct this issue under guarantee, and a permanent solution will come later.

# **Got Keys?**

A couple years ago we undertook a comprehensive re-keying of the church facility, in part to keep better track of keys distributed to church members who need them for committee responsibilities. Only certain positions require access to the building or church office; most others in the congregation do not need such access.

If you finish a term as a committee chair or another "key" position, we ask that you return your key to the church office.

In addition to helping us keep track of keys, this policy ensures that new officers may be given keys without making new copies. **Your** cooperation is as appreciated as your willingness to serve!

# **Redeemer** The Life of Jimmy Carter



General Synod or our Conference may adopt a position, this church, along with any other local church, is given the freedom and responsibility to prayerfully consider whether another setting of the church speaks on its behalf.

This approach to church life asks much of the individual believer and the faith community of which he or she is a part. It means being familiar with what is going in one's neighborhood, one's country, and one's world and then considering matters within the context of one's faith. It also means engaging others who might disagree, with faithfulness, charity, and love. There are so many hot-button issues today ranging from social policy to foreign affairs where Christians all too often behave in anything but Christian fashion. We have an opportunity to show that it is possible to do otherwise, that within Jesus Christ we can love one another, even when—no, especially when—we disagree.

The work of the church is not done. We are still called to witness to and work for God's love for all Creation. This work will not always be easy, and we will not always agree on what it requires of us. But with open hearts and open minds, we will be able to create space for the Holy Spirit to work in us and through us. We will be able to move closer to the new Jerusalem, the kingdom of heaven, God's new creation, which, though it may seem to be appearing in fits and starts, is without doubt emerging all around us.

### Two Items from FCC's History

"Park at Lebanon, NH, after the Big Fire, May 10, 1887." (Above) This photograph of Colburn Park in the spring of 1887 shows an assortment of displaced citizens and their possessions, following one of the greatest disasters of the late 19th century. First Congregational Church, then 59 years old, rises in the background (top right); note the two-story building, Gile's tailor shop, then standing in front of the church. The photo was taken by Charles E. Lewis, Barbara Sargent's grandfather.

Letter from the Building Committee, 1969. (*Right*) In the spring of 1969, a building committee formed by FCC's Board of Governors sent an appeal to the congregation, asking for help in funding a much-needed addition "to provide offices for the Minister and Church Secretary." Approved at a special congregational meeting in April, the project's cost was expected to be \$20,000, "about fifty percent more than our annual operating budget." The letter was signed by Francis A. Sargent, Gordon's father, and this particular copy was addressed to Bessie Lewis, Barbara's mother. "Let's make this a UNITED EFFORT," it concludes, "shared by all and not just a few!"

TO ALL MEMBERS and FRIENDS OF THE CHURCH --

The Annual Meeting of the Church on February 4, 1969 was recessed until April 30, 1969. The Board of Governors was instructed to explore the different possibilities to provide offices for the Minister and Church Secretary and to bring their recommendation before the Church membership at the reconvened meeting.

At the reconvened meeting April 30, 1969 the Board presented two or three plans for an addition to the present structure. The plan as described in the enclosed brochure was approved by a nearly unanimous vote of those present. The Treasurer was authorized to borrow a sum of money not to exceed \$15,000 to enable the Church to go ahead with the building of this addition. The Chairman of the Board of Governors was instructed to appoint a Building Committee to follow through on this project and to develop ways and means of raising the funds to cover the cost.

It is the belief of the committee that the amount needed to build and furnish these offices can be raised by subscription of the membership and Church friends on a pledge basis over a period of three years. The total cost of the project will be approximately \$20,000 including the architect's fee and furnishings and equipment. This is about fifty per cent more than our annual operating budget and is, of course, in addition to our annual giving.

Hoping that you will want to be a part of this undertaking, we have provided the enclosed card for your convenience in making your pledge. Please give this careful thought and complete the card, pledging as much as possible, indicating your preferred schedule of payment - either quarterly (12 installments), semi-annually (6 installments), or annually (3 installments) over a three-year period.

If you would prefer to discuss this further before completing your card, please contact any member of the committee and we will be happy to call on you personally. Let's make this a UNITED EFFORT, shared by all and not just a few! We will appreciate your cooperation, participation and financial support.
