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The Pastoral Perspective

George Herbert (1593-1633) was a prolific English poet who served as an Anglican priest during the reign of James I. Herbert is one whose writings I will turn to whenever I'm seeking some inspiration, and, I'm happy to admit, I turn to him now as I grapple with the question, "What should I write about this Advent?"

Hoping to find something appropriate for this liturgical season, I came across this short poem, "JESU," included in *The Temple*, his volume of collected poems published posthumously in 1633:

J E S U is in my heart, his sacred name
Is deeply carved there: but th'other week
A great affliction broke the little frame,
Ev'n all to pieces: which I went to seek:
And first I found the corner, where was J,
After, where E, S, and next where U was graved.
When I had got these parcels, instantly
I sat me down to spell them, and perceived
That to my broken heart he was I ease you,
And to my whole is J E S U.

Now just what are we looking for in Advent but the Christ-child, the one we profess is God's love and faithfulness made incarnate? When we are troubled, it is to God that we look. We may be heartbroken, we may be lost, but we are not alone. For at those moments, we ought to recall the words of Isaiah 40, in which the prophet tells us that God has said, "Comfort, O Comfort my people."

The text of Isaiah 40 dates to the Babylonian Exile. Imagine being torn from your home, deported to another country, and wondering whether anything would ever get better. The author of Isaiah believed things would improve. The author believed in God, and God's promises—something we, too, would do well to do.

Sure, the world's messed up right now. Wars are raging, hate seems to be on the march, and you can probably add to this list of woes. But the truth is, things now are way better than they were during the exile, for us and

NEWS AND NOTES

CHURCH COUNCIL

Jon Scott opened Council's meeting in November with an appeal to focus on work that needs to happen prior to the end of the calendar year or Annual Meeting in February, such as budget and financial matters.

In his pastor's report the Rev. Steve Silver reflected on the previous night's Diaconate meeting. He noted the uncertain status of the ecumenical Thanksgiving service, due to the unavailability of other clergy and a lack of enthusiasm for the service among our own congregation. He invited comments from Council on the matter, and several expressed the reluctant but clear view that there doesn't seem to be enough interest to justify Steve's effort to prepare for the service. Linda Gerlach reported a consensus among Deacons that it's not worth offering the service, given the lack of interest and the busy holiday week. Recognizing similar agreement among Council members, Jon recommended clear communication that this is not a permanent decision, applying only to this year. Steve expressed thanks for Council's advice and noted that he would convey the decision to the congregation.

Steve also noted that he'd attended his final meeting of the APD LifeCare board, on which he has served a sixyear term. He has enjoyed working with the group and appreciates what APD does in the community.

Steve continued with a word about Stewardship Sunday, encouraging everyone to think prayerfully about their 2024 pledge to FCC. He took care to emphasize the importance of participation, of simply making a commitment, over any particular dollar amount. He shared his deep appreciation of everyone's generosity. Corrine Erskine asked if individual congregants would bring pledges up to the altar, as was done in the past, and Steve confirmed that he would invite people to do that.

Lastly, Steve noted that he would be attending a meeting of the **Granite State Organizing Project**, a successor to the now-defunct United Valley Interfaith Project. The meeting will focus on how faith communities are engaged in affordable-housing issues and solutions. He invited others to attend in person or by Zoom.

Linda Gerlach reported further on the **Diaconate's** discussion of the ecumenical service and hopes for the Children's Community Corner. Drawing from Dawn Troutman's visit to the West Lebanon church, the group also considered inviting more congregational participation in service opportunities such as altar flowers and coffee hour provisions. Regarding the latter, it has seemed difficult to expand volunteers beyond a small group; it was suggested that the sign-up list be placed more visibly on the food table.

Linda Oronte, noting a resurgence of COVID and her experience as a nurse, questioned whether we should continue **coffee hour** through the winter months. Several appreciated the concern, agreeing that holiday travel has typically brought increased illness. Corrine suggested that Steve try to gauge the congregation's cur-

rent comfort level with coffee hour, and Walter Scott asked that we verify our capacity for air filtration in the Parish Hall. Linda Gerlach noted that everyone is free to make their own choices for whether or not to attend coffee hour, and that those who do are responsible enough to know the possible risks. Jon Scott recognized the need to balance our wishes for social interaction with our obligation to care for the health of our congregation. Steve thanked everyone for their insights, assuring that we would monitor and adjust the situation as needed.

Walter acknowledged that he still needs to submit budget requests for 2024 on behalf of the **Board of Governors**. He further reported on some minor landscaping and repairs at the Parsonage.

Dawn Troutman referred to her **Treasurer's** report, showing income continuing to run behind expenses. Within that income, stewardship collections have fallen well short of the year's \$100,000 goal, although we do still expect some substantial contributions before year's end. We expect expenses to rise next year, with (among other things) the possible hiring of new staff for the Children's

Community Corner. Dawn thanked several people for their help in 2024 budget planning, which is far ahead of where it's been in past years.

Considering the parallel work of the Personnel Committee on staff compensation, Jon affirmed that those figures would be finalized as close as possible to January 1, which would allow ample time for Council to review the budget prior to Annual Meeting. Valerie Nevel elaborated that the Personnel Committee seeks to be more active than in the past, with the goal of institutionalizing and formalizing more of the church's operations and job descriptions, perhaps with support from a humanresources consultant. The committee hopes to establish greater clarity and continuity regarding staff responsibilities and compensation.

For the **Trustees**, Valerie added a note about plans for a meeting on Zoom with United Church Funds representatives to review our UCF investments, inviting any interested member to join. She also noted that the Mission and Social Action Committee would meet for the last time in 2023 on November 27.

Jon concluded the meeting with his sincere encouragement to participate in Advent and Christmas services. Addressing the CCC's interim status, Steve confirmed that we would still plan to have a children's pageant as usual during the 5:00 service, with a later service at 8:00. Both services will be available on Zoom, along with the morning service that day, as Christmas Eve falls on a Sunday this year. There followed general conversation about the many ways our church can attract new people, welcome them, and retain them.

DIACONATE

At the Deacons' November meeting, the Rev. Steve Silver celebrated new covenant members Jim Hughes and Robert Crockett. He also mentioned the challenge of organizing this year's ecumenical Thanksgiving service, due to limitations on other clergy. It was suggested that perhaps an athome meditation could serve as an alternative.

The Deacons also discussed coffeehour provisions and how to facilitate **volunteer sign-up**. They considered offering a broader sign-up board to engage other roles, such as flower arrangements. Dawn Troutman offered to provide an example from another church.

Steve then explained the need for a children's ministry that could cover a full age range from small toddlers up to teenagers. Engaging the older youth would require consistency in staff involved, and so it would be advisable to hire a paid coordinator. The Deacons discussed the relative advantages of scheduling children's activities before, during, or after the main worship service, possibly in conjunction with adult learning opportunities. It was noted that parents may differ widely in their preferences for exposing their kids to more disturbing or challenging topics and discussions.

for the world. Still, we can complain and God will be present for us, and God will help us put the pieces of our broken lives back together.

None of this may be easy, but it is possible. Some of our contemporaries are doubtful, suggesting that we don't need God, that God does not exist, that we can solve all of our problems on our own. Really? Our track record, throughout our history, is that we are good at making problems, not so good at fixing them. Oh yes, we need to keep working on them. But we do not need to act alone.

God-with-us, Emmanuel, we call out during Advent. In just a few weeks, we will celebrate Christ's birth, and we will draw comfort that God is present, now and always.
