The Pastoral Perspective

Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love.

These are the four themes of Advent, at least according to the Internet and tradition. Maybe you know these. Me? I did not know this about Advent until this year. I did know that the third Sunday of Advent was dedicated to *gaudete*, or joy. But other than that, nothing.

While one of my clergy colleagues suggests the themes were originally a device used to market calendars, I don't think the origin is so important. The themes make sense as a way for us to understand the season.

As Christians, we should always have hope. We should anticipate peace. Joy at the prospect of Jesus' arrival? Sure. (Think of the shepherds in Luke for a good example of joy in action.) And then there is love. Well, we read in the first letter to John (4:8) that "God is love," so who are we to argue?

I think these four themes are good for us to entertain during the season of Advent. There is no mention of a season of Advent in the Bible. Early Christians just began to have a sense of anticipation, focused mostly on the Parousia, the expected return of Christ, which they believed to be imminent.

But time passed. Things changed, and so did perceptions. The imminence of Jesus' return may have been understood differently, but it was no less longed for. People began to recall the past, and they began to tell the story of Jesus' birth in more detail. What was in some ways an afterthought (there is, after all, no Nativity in Mark's Gospel!) took on more and more importance, to the point where all of Christendom now awaits the birth of the Savior.

Nowadays, Christmas is, for many, the Big Day, and not so much because Jesus will be born, but because of... Santa Claus.

Santa Claus is an iteration of Saint Nicholas, who was a real person, the Bishop of Myra. Nicholas (ca. 270-343) was a Greek Christian from Asia Minor, and this has led to the historically uninformed speculation that he was a Turk (the Ottomans would not conquer Anatolia for another 1,300 years). So, Nicholas was not a Turk, but a Greek, and he possibly participated in the Council of Nicaea in 325. He is remembered for gift-

giving and for being the patron saint of both children and sailors. The latter role led to his popularity in the Low Countries and his incarnation as Sinterklaas, who made his way to New Amsterdam (New York). From there, the rest is history and a continually unfolding story.

This year, thanks to Target, we now have "hot Santa"—no girth, just cut abs—and he seems to have caught on with a segment of the population. On November 28 the *New York Times* posed (and answered) the question, "Did the World Need a Hot Santa? It Got One Anyway." So, Santa has gone from being a cleric in the Roman Empire to a sales associate named Kris K. All interesting, but absolutely nothing to do with Jesus, who, as clichéd as it may sound, is the reason for the season.

Our God is one of hope, peace, joy, and love. In a time that is downright weird, we have the opportunity to welcome a God—no, *the* God—who brings us all we truly need. Happy Advent, and Merry Christmas.
