The Pastoral Perspective

"The Call"

Come, my Way, my Truth, my Life:

Such a Way, as gives us breath:

Such a Truth, as ends all strife:

Such a Life, as killeth death.

Come, my Light, my Feast, my Strength:

Such a Light, as shows a feast:

Such a Feast, as mends in length:

Such a Strength, as makes his guest.

Come, my Joy, my Love, my Heart:

Such a Joy, as none can move:

Such a Love, as none can part:

Such a Heart, as joyes in love.

George Herbert wrote and published this poem in 1633, the year of his death, as part of a collection entitled *The Temple*. Herbert, a priest in the Church of England, took up his vocation after excelling at Cambridge and being tipped for a promising career in public life. Although he was a brilliant orator and had caught the eye of King James I, Herbert had long sensed a call to ministry, a call to which he responded in the 1620s.

He had begun writing poetry by then, before becoming ordained as a deacon. Ultimately, he found himself ministering to the people of Bremerton, fully investing himself in life as a country parson. As he did this, he wrote and revised his poetry, exploring in verse the rich tapestry of the Christian life.

Through Herbert's verse, we are offered not only a panoramic view of Christian living but a beautiful example of one person's desire to discern God's action in and hopes for his life. This summer, when we have a quiet moment to spare—perhaps sitting on the porch, taking a

BOARD OF GOVERNORS

In May the Board of Governors discussed a number of **pending projects**—bids for refinishing the floor in the Parish Hall; progress on the kitchen water-heater upgrade; potential replacement of shrubs in the front yard; and exterior signage to direct visitors around the church campus. John Gilliatt proposed giving Council a three-year plan of all potential projects, costs, and priorities, in order to accommodate them in budget planning.

In the Sanctuary, the Board has consulted with Don Collins about extensive painting work that remains to be done, a project that would necessarily affect other tasks such as recarpeting and pew-cushion replacement. The tall Sanctuary windows will be professionally washed in mid-July, and the Board continues to consider options for curtains or shades.

There is also interest in making the lectern portable, so that any groups that use the chancel and altar area would have additional spatial flexibility. This project would involve unobtrusively detaching the lectern from the chancel and relocating the audio equipment currently housed in it. Everyone agreed this was possible and saw the benefit of concealing electronic equipment and wiring. Steve Silver, though, emphasized that portability of the pulpit would not be an option, stressing the

primacy of the space's liturgical and spiritual character.

DIACONATE

At their June retreat, the Deacons considered priorities and dreams for the year ahead. These include building on our recent success of bringing new people into the FCC congregation, an effort supported by our location, our music ministry, our children's programs, and Steve Silver's preaching. Deacons then emphasized the need to be aware of and offer "human nourishment" to all those who enter our church. They agreed on the importance of opening our common life to the wider community through musical events, ecumenical services like Praise in the Park, and movie nights and other youth events.

The Deacons also considered our collective spiritual growth, in order to build our relationships with God and our wider community and world. Steve Silver invited suggestions from the congregation in this regard; past ideas that might be revived include a lay prayer group, a book group, a labyrinthwalk exercise in meditative prayer, and a relaunched Bible study group. The FCC website could also offer the opportunity to post prayer requests, and Steve added a suggestion that we pray regularly for the UCC, the NH Conference, and individual congregations in need of support.

Deacons also recognized the need for supporting deeper and more robust stewardship, of both financial resources and time and talents. Members could perhaps deliver stewardship messages more often during worship, and some "coaching" and education about our stewardship ministry were also suggested, possibly engaging outside speakers.

To support our music ministry, we might feature special worship music on (for example) the third Sunday of each month, such as Shaker songs or a jazz service. We could also solicit congregational hymn suggestions more often. The Deacons agree on the importance of inviting feedback from the full congregation about our music ministry and ongoing conversation with the Music Committee.

The June retreat offered Deacons a chance to revisit their **individual member lists** and offer strategies for maintaining congregational contact more effectively. Members of the congregation should receive more directed information about all of FCC's ministries and programs. The Deacons also noted the inadequate degree of accessibility and comfortable seating in our Sanctuary.

The Diaconate is also considering the need to visibly strengthen our church's invitation as an **Open and Affirming (ONA)** congregation. It is important to make it clearer that we welcome all God's people,

regardless of race, class, ability, or sexual orientation or gender identity. Suggestions in this regard included adding our ONA status to church signage and advertisements, inviting a gay men's chorus to perform at FCC, and focusing our efforts to welcome members of the local Jamaican community who have already attended worship here.

Steve Silver anticipates taking a sabbatical sometime after February 2017, which will require FCC to provide worship leadership in his absence. The Deacons decided that hiring an interim pastor would be preferable to filling in with multiple one-time or short-term guests. It was noted, however, that any interim choice would have to come from outside the membership of the church. Similarly, Deacons recognized the need to form a three-person In-Care Committee for Eliot Fay, ideally to meet by the end of the summer.

The retreat group also considered how to improve our **pastoral care efforts**, specifically how our lay individuals and groups could better supplement Steve Silver's own pastoral care work. It was suggested that Called to Care and the Prayer Team could be merged into a stronger Lay Pastoral Care Ministry, supported by stronger congregational participation.

The Deacons concluded their productive, successful retreat by sharing communion and prayer.

Call for Nominations — 5th Annual Micah Awards Sponsored by the United Valley Interfaith Project (UVIP)

The prophet Micah calls us to consider what it means to live into God's expectations for us, offering guidance on how to live up to those expectations: "And what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" (Micah 6:8)

UVIP's Micah Awards annually recognize local "Micah Heroes" who live into the prophet's words in some exemplary manner—people who contribute time and energy to community service, who consistently volunteer themselves to work for a vital cause, who offer their community a living role model of faith in service. Each UVIP member organization is invited to honor its own Micah Hero.

All are welcome to nominate up to three members of our congregation who best represent the spirit of the Micah Awards (only our previous winners, Ron Bailey and Pete Mason, are ineligible). 
