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The Pastoral Perspective

On the second Sunday of June our Eastertide journey will reach its climactic finish with the celebration of Pentecost. It is on this day that we, along with millions of Christians around the world, will mark with word and song that long-ago gift of the Holy Spirit promised by Jesus, which signaled the birth of what we have come to know as the church.

Our Christian faith posits that the arrival of the Holy Spirit—the Advocate, the Comforter, that person of the Trinity who animates the life of God's gathered people—was a discrete historical event, something that took place at a moment in time, in a particular place. Yet this event is ongoing. The Spirit was not deposited on the doorstep of the church like a phone book or package. Instead, it arrived, animated and animating. Put another way, if Christmas marks the arrival of the Christ child, Emmanuel, God with us, Pentecost marks the arrival of the Holy Spirit, Emmanuel, God with us.

Confusing? Opaque? Don't worry! This is the Trinity we're talking about, after all. The day when we feel that our language can wholly encompass and explain God is the day we should admit our delusions have gotten the better of us. We can never truly comprehend God—after all, we are finite beings, while the One who created us, who redeemed us, who sustains us, is infinite. That doesn't mean we should stop talking about God, however. Far from it; instead, we should embrace our limits and work within them, for in doing so we can see things anew.

I firmly believe that seeing things in a new light is this generation's vocation. Doing so doesn't mean abandoning the tenets of our faith. It does, however, require that we acknowledge just how much the world around us is changing and how such change demands we find newly engaging, compelling ways to tell the "old, old story."

Pentecost Sunday will offer our community a chance to consider this proposition. For that day is also Children's Sunday. Over the past year our young people have been learning about life in biblical times. We as

COMMITTEE NOTES

CHURCH COUNCIL

At the May Council meeting, Barry Schuster reported for the Finance Committee that while pledges are perhaps a bit slow, the monthly budget report shows nothing unusual. The committee has also been determining the appropriate compensation for the new organist position.

There was continued discussion about heating costs. Jennifer Grant wondered how we might obtain more information about optimal institutional heating costs and efficiency. Jon Scott added that the Stewardship Committee is interested in having an energy audit done for the church facility. All agreed that the Board of Governors should make energy efficiency and resource use a priority, perhaps with Jon acting as an advisor given his expertise in environmental initiatives.

Corrine Erskine reported for Mission and Social Action that Steve Silver had inquired about replenishing funding for housing and rent assistance, demand for which has been acute recently. Requests come to the church office or to Steve directly, and typically the church disburses no more than \$50 at a time, primarily for Lebanon residents and payable only to landlords themselves. A motion to transfer \$1,000 from the Dole Fund for community housing and rent assistance passed unanimously.

On behalf of the Stewardship Committee, Jon Scott asked for help in getting particular details about church finances and budget (e.g., how many give to a certain special offering). The committee would like to communicate to the congregation more effectively, and with more data.

Brian Clancy noted Classicopia's performances in May, June, and July. He added that a number of instrumental recitals were also taking place at church in the next month. The recitals demonstrate that the community recognizes the Sanctuary as a quality space for musical performance, and they attract people to the church who might not otherwise come here.

There followed a brief discussion about the **use of church space by outside groups**, musical or not. Brian reviewed our usage fees and explained that our usual practice (if not actually a stated policy) is to accommodate groups with some flexibility—we try not to deny any reasonable use request because of an inability to pay fees.

Brian reported that the search for a new organist/choir director produced four candidates, two of whom were interviewed in early May. After contacting references, the search committee has referred its final choice to the Personnel Committee.

Jennifer Grant reported that the **Diaconate** had sponsored a

presentation by Lee Webster on green burials. The Deacons have also discussed how to serve young families, keeping in mind the discernment goal of Growing Younger, and have tried to stay informed about the proposal for a Community Nurse. There are plans for another "Outing Club" event at Boston Lot, which will be opened up to the community as well. More hikes and forums are planned for the fall.

The Deacons have continued their "Experiencing the Divine" discussions, sharing personal experiences of how God and their faith are present in their lives. All have found these discussions spiritually renewing, interesting, and rewarding.

Jennifer regrets that Carol Kingston, who had hoped to join the Diaconate, will be unable to do so at this time because of personal circumstances.

Pete Mason reported that Nora Miller had cleaned up and planted the memorial gardens and some other spots around the church, for which everyone is grateful!

Reporting for the **Board of Governors**, Pete added that the bathroom toilets will be replaced with units that are easier to flush while still using water efficiently.

Amy Driscoll reported that Women of the Church will be

hosting Carmen Blandin

Amy also noted that some have suggested receptions (and coffee hours, etc.) have perhaps become more elaborate than they need to be. All agreed that any reception should always be about fellowship first; there shouldn't be any expectation (either by those

attending or by those serving) that a full spread should be provided. Reducing the scale of ordinary receptions might also allow for more generosity on special occasions.

Steve Silver noted that he's been attending to several pastoral-care issues. He promoted **Children's Sunday (June 8),** for which Marcia Corkins, other volunteers, and the children themselves have worked hard to prepare.

Adding to Jennifer's comments about young families, Steve also considered what we can do for these families, both those who are already here and those that we hope to attract to FCC.

Steve noted that **Praise in the Park** this year is scheduled for July
27. He is happy to report that First
Baptist Church will be involved,
and that the Methodist Church's
new pastor will be preaching.

In June 2007 Carmen Tarleton's estranged husband broke into her rural Vermont home and beat her savagely. Despite blindness and significant disfiguration from what doctors called "the most horrific injury a human being could suffer," she survived numerous surgeries and a facial transplant.

Carmen emerged from this unspeakable trauma with an awakened purpose and determined joy. In national interviews, speaking engagements, and now a book, she has shared her struggle and triumph over catastrophe, inspiring others who have suffered from domestic violence, abuse, and other personal tragedies.

All are invited to attend Carmen's special presentation on June 14 in the Sanctuary. We would like to open this invitation to the wider community, so please bring or encourage your friends to attend. (In particular, we are inviting other area churches and our mission partner WISE.) Bike & Build Returns to the Upper Valley!

Tuesday Afternoon to Thursday Morning, June 17-19

Now in its twelfth summer, the Bike & Build program consists of ten cross-country biking trips to raise money and awareness for affordable housing. Stopping along their routes to participate in construction efforts, groups of 18- to 25-year-old riders experience first-hand the considerable need for affordable housing across the country. These cyclist-builders also meet with local officials and community members to discuss housing-related issues. Each rider raises at least \$4,500 to help fund the trip's costs and housing efforts nationwide.

Once again, FCC will be hosting 30+ cyclists on Bike & Build's northern route. On their tenweek journey from Portsmouth, NH, to Vancouver, BC, the group will join projects at ten sites; in the Upper Valley, they will work with Habitat for Humanity and Cover Home Repair, and Twin Pines Housing Trust.



The bikers will again stay at church, but we hope to involve our ecumenical neighbors in the effort to feed and serve the group while they're here. Our cool basement will offer a welcome respite after the trip's challenging first leg from Portsmouth. We'll also provide meals and arrange a short presentation in which the bikers will share their experiences and aspirations. Tentatively, we would also like to offer a bike clinic for youth riders (ages 5-14).
