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The "Pastoral" Perspective

Editor's Note: The Rev. Steve Silver is on sabbatical until mid-September 2017. While he is away, four of our Deacons have volunteered to write this regular feature. We're grateful this month to **Jon Scott** for offering his perspective.

On a recent trip to visit family in the Washington, DC area, I drove by a church with a large, multi-colored banner stretched outside. It said, simply, "In this house we believe," followed by a list of statements:

In this house, we believe, "Black lives matter."

We believe, "Love is love."

We believe, "Women's rights are human rights."

We believe, "No human is illegal."

We believe, "Science is real."

We believe, "Water is life."

We believe, "in religious freedom."

We believe, "Kindness is everything."

My first thoughts after seeing this banner were, "This is a church I'd want to belong to," "What denomination is this?" and, "These are people I'd like to worship with." Then I wondered to myself, "How do this sign and my immediate responses to it compare to our own church and congregation?"

What about our own signs? We have a few. We have our "permanent" sign, to which a rainbow stripe has recently been added, signifying our Open and Affirming status. Our Deacons recently decided to double the width of the rainbow to make it more visible to passers-by. We also have banners welcoming guests to our monthly community dinners,

COMMITTEE NOTES

CHURCH COUNCIL

At Council's May meeting, John Gilliatt reported on the Board of Governors' recent work—repairs on the front portico decking, window cleaning, and a productive Spring Clean-Up on May 13. Projects that day included yard debris clearance, painting touch-ups, a paint inventory, and an exhaustive survey of both circuit panels. Future projects include repainting the access ramp, sealing the front walk, landscaping and trimming, and weather-sealing the front Sanctuary doors. The Parish Hall floor will be refinished this summer.

John also raised the idea of setting up a church credit-card account, a need that has long been considered. In particular, John noted that it would make Board of Governors purchases easier and relieve members of individual financial obligations. Steve Silver and Brian Clancy, who often must purchase supplies and services for the church, have both expressed interest in a credit card. Brian will speak to Treasurer Terry Ellison about finding a good option for a corporate card and identifying those who would need cards.

Marcia Corkins noted for Christian Education that the Lenten Lunch Bag collection raised a total of \$700, which will be split between Epilogos and supplies for David's House. A puppet show by Lindsay's Puppet Pals will be May 20, and Children's Sunday will be June 18.

Pete Mason reported for **Memorial Gardens** that Alyson Danyew-Ellison will be taking over planting duties, with guidance from Nora Miller.

The Millers are moving from the area; Council members gratefully acknowledged Nora for all of her generous service in taking care of the gardens for many years.

For the Diaconate, Barb Jones noted considerations of what the lay pastoral care ministry might involve going forward, with updating member lists and training of those in the congregation who wish to be involved. Some deacons are working on our congregation's approaches to prayer. Alyson Danyew-Ellison and Barb Teeter will represent FCC on the Community Nursing board, and Barb Jones and Sue Pratt are working on UVIP's "Aging with Dignity" curriculum.

Barb also reported that Hilary Ryder, who is moving to Hanover and cannot devote as much time to the Diaconate, would be stepping down. Former deacon Susan Montmagny has offered to serve out Hilary's term, and Council unanimously approved Susan's reappointment.

Amy Driscoll recommended that the Nominating Committee always have a Diaconate representative, as that group requires at least four new nominees annually. Amy also noted that King Arthur Flour could commit to donating the bread for the Crop Walk each fall.

For Mission and Social Action, Corrine Erskine stated that Bike & Build preparations were mostly set, with Jon Scott and Steve Teeter volunteering to lead food provisions. Biff Simpson's improv-comedy group will entertain the bikers their first night, but it was generally agreed that a presentation by the bikers could be omitted this year. Several expressed interest in having them do a children's bike clinic, however. It was agreed that the congregation should have some opportunity to meet the group.

Steve Silver's Pastor's Report was distributed prior to the meeting, but he reviewed pastoral coverage and his own plans for his sabbatical (May 17-September 12). He noted plans for a liturgy of farewell for Mark and Marty Rowell on June 18, as Mark prepares to take up his new pastoral position in Pennsylvania. Steve also noted that John Torrey, who is in discernment with the Grafton-Orange-Sullivan Association, has arranged to serve at FCC this summer as a field-education intern, working with Jo Shelnutt.

Steve reported that our **signatory authorizations** at Mascoma Bank had been updated. He stressed the need to monitor this in the future.

Barb Jones asked whether progress had been made in finding new childcare providers. It was suggested that adults might be recruited from the congregation on a short-term basis. It may also be possible to find an interested Dartmouth student; a position listing will be distributed.

Brian Clancy noted a busy schedule of **concerts and recitals**, and he reported on discussions with Linda Secord, president of Bel Canto Chamber Singers, about the group's returning to FCC in the fall for rehearsals and performances. Brian pointed out that this would fit well with a potential collaboration on ticketing and promotion with the Lebanon Opera House, a plan that is still very preliminary.

As not enough people had reviewed Jon Scott's **Stewardship** proposal for online giving yet, it was decided that Council would review it by email prior to the June meeting.

After again thanking the church and congregation for supporting his imminent sabbatical, Steve Silver closed the meeting with prayer.

DIACONATE

At their May meeting, the Deacons confirmed that they will meet the first Wednesday of the month during the summer, but will reconsider that meeting date in the fall. Susan Montmagny has agreed to fill in for Hilary Ryder until the fall.

Four Diaconate volunteers will write the monthly "Pastoral Perspective" column while Steve Silver is away on sabbatical. Jon Scott will write the June piece, with Kathy Beckett, Susan Montmagny, and Sue Pratt following in successive months.

Terry Ellison has agreed to serve as **Diaconate Treasurer**, succeeding Ginger Smith, who has ably filled this role during the last two years.

The lay pastoral care ministry will involve a multi-pronged approach to various aspects of congregational care, in addition to direct pastoral care provided by Steve Silver. These aspects include ministering to those on the Deacons' lists, with attention to individual needs; recruiting and training congregational volunteers to provide pastoral care that will not duplicate the Deacons' work; facilitating the practice of prayer and participation in FCC's Prayer Team; and introducing a prayer shawl ministry to provide comfort to those experiencing difficulties.

Other needs include visitation, making calls and sending cards, delivering Communion, and providing rides and meals. The program also encompasses the Community Nurse Program, providing services to both the congregation and the community

at-large. Alyson Danyew-Ellison and Barb Teeter will represent FCC on its board and take part in hiring the Community Nurse. Volunteers will also be trained to facilitate UVIP's Aging with Dignity program. Additional discussion will take place in the fall; Barb Jones is the contact person for the lay pastoral care ministry.

In his Pastor's Report, Steve Silver confirmed sabbatical coverage and clarified that Io Shelnutt will not be a full-time pastor; she will preach, lead worship, and offer emergency pastoral care. She will also direct the Musical Drama Camp in August. (She asked not to preach on August 27, and Biff Simpson volunteered to do so on that date.) Jo will start on June 18, on which date there will also be a liturgy of farewell and commissioning for Mark Rowell. Jo will also lead a committal service for Helen Wallace in the Memorial Garden on June 24. Praise in the Park will occur on July 23, and we will again do a pulpit exchange with West Lebanon UCC the first two weeks of August.

There was also discussion of recent problems with the Sanctuary sound system. Susan Montmagny's son, who has expertise in this area, will troubleshoot and recommend solutions.

In other business, Deacons were asked to support the Relay for Life, the Prouty, and Wings for Hope. Jon Scott will continue to provide gluten-free bread for Communion. And the rainbow stripe on our church sign, indicating our ONA status, has been made more visible.



announcing our Music at the Meetinghouse concerts, and conveying information and an invitation for special worship events and activities.

What do you think? What do our signs and banners communicate to our community? Are they welcoming and inviting? Will a wider rainbow stripe help convey the meaning we intend? How would you feel about a banner like the one I saw outside that church in DC? Let's revisit that question in a moment.

First, though, I'd like to go on record affirming my view of the people I've been privileged to know at First Congregational Church of Lebanon. "These are people I'd like to worship with." We've been members and Sunday regulars now for almost thirty years. We must be doing something—a lot of things—right.

At a recent church committee meeting, I shared my experience seeing that banner in DC and read its full text to the group. Some were pleased and inspired to hear those words, while others seemed to convey a bit of dismay or discomfort, at least through their body language. Why was that? I've been meditating and praying on this question over the past few weeks. I have a feeling that ten years ago, these statements might have seemed less familiar but would also have been less discomforting to some. If you look at their plain meanings, there seems to be little with which a person of faith might disagree. But today, each of these statements can be interpreted in a political and social context, and our political and social discourse seem more polarizing than ever. Still, what is it about combining these statements of belief as external expressions of a faith community that can make people uncomfortable?

Surely, we are not called to avoid things which might make us or others around us uncomfortable. That was not the path Jesus took in his own life and ministry, offering examples we are meant to understand, embrace, and follow to the best of our flawed human abilities. Jesus engaged regularly with the social injustices of his time and calls on us, his followers, to do likewise.

What do the words "Black Lives Matter" mean to you? How would you define "human rights"? What do "Science" and "Faith" have to do with one another? Do you feel discomfort or disagreement or perhaps even anger when you read the words on that banner? Then let's talk about it. Let's listen to one another. Let's do so with patience and respect and love. Let's pray and worship together. Let's find ways to break down the discomfort or disagreement and focus on the things that unite us as followers of Jesus. Isn't that what we are called to do? "Kindness is everything."



The Open Door Ministry

Supporting Our Community, One Gift Card at a Time

Throughout the year, our neighbors come to the church office seeking assistance. Whether it's a tank of gas for the car, some food for dinner, or a contribution toward rent or the electric bill, our congregation is able to help, thanks to the **Open Door Ministry**. Available to anyone in greater Lebanon, this is one of the most vital services we extend to our community.

We don't ask questions about need or use; the Open Door is just that. We do ask that people wait between four and six months between their requests, only because the overall need is great. We *never* have enough money to help all those who need assistance, and that's not an exaggeration—it's the truth. While FCC has responded to these needs for years, demand for assistance has increased considerably in the recent past.



Those who seek help from us haven't been irresponsible or lazy, and the clear majority of them (about 80%) request assistance just once or twice. With just a handful of exceptions in the past several years, they don't become dependent or try to take advantage of the program. Some are chronically homeless; some have just been evicted for reasons beyond their control. Sometimes they've just moved to the area and need a hand getting started; sometimes they've lost a job or just started a new one. Some are driving to and from the hospital more often because they're caring for a sick family member; some have been referred to us by a counselor at WISE. So many of our neighbors in the Upper Valley need our help.





The Open Door is kept open by contributions to the monthly Communion Offering, from which the Diaconate purchases of \$25 gift cards for gas and food from JAKE'S and PRICE CHOPPER, respectively. This is supplemented by the Mission and Social Action Fund (from the Dole Trust), which provides assistance in modest amounts for rent and utilities. In any of these cases, our ability to support those in need depends on you, our congregation. Because you give each month to the Communion Offering, we can help a lot of people. We hope you'll participate in this vital act of stewardship, this month and in the months that follow.

Bike & Build Returns to FCC!

Monday to Wednesday, June 19-21



On June 19-21, First Congregational Church of Lebanon will host 36 cyclists from **Bike & Build**, a program that advocates and raises funds for affordable-housing reform nationwide. Riders on eight cross-country routes work with Habitat for Humanity and local organizations on a variety of home repair and construction projects. These spirited, enterprising twenty-somethings also meet with community members and local officials to discuss housing-related issues. To participate, each biker-builder raises at least \$4000 toward costs and support for the program's grant-making foundation.

Over the past fourteen summers, over 3,300 biker-builders have generated more than \$6.2 million, contributed about 225,000 hours of construction, and pedaled roughly 10.5 million miles, biking from one site to the next and raising awareness of our national housing crisis along the way.

Starting in Portsmouth and finishing in early September in Bellingham, WA, Bike & Build's Northern Route stops in Lebanon each year for one of its ten build sites. The Lebanon United Methodist Church hosted them starting in 2005, and they've stayed at FCC since 2008. They'll sleep and eat at our church, and they'll work on Tuesday, June 20, with Upper Valley Habitat and Cover Home Repair.




