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The Pastoral Perspective

One of the appointed readings for the Twentieth Sunday in Pentecost is Psalm 137. Many of you may not be as familiar with this text as with, say, the 23rd Psalm. But I suspect a lot of those reading this message recognize Psalm 137's opening verse: "By the rivers of Babylon—there we sat down and there we wept when we remembered Zion." These lines, too, are probably familiar: "If I forget you, O Jerusalem, let my right hand wither! Let my tongue cling to the roof of my mouth, if I do not remember you, if I do not set Jerusalem above my highest joy (v. 5-6)."

These are powerful words of yearning. But for all their pathos, these verses pale in intensity to the Psalm's closing plea. This final verse startles us, and its sentiment makes Psalm 137 a most ironic reading for World Communion Sunday, observed on the first Sunday of October: "Happy shall they be who take your little ones and dash them against the rock!"

Psalm 137:9 is one of the most jarring sentences in all of Scripture. Born out of the bitterness of exile, it is a raw, unvarnished cry of pain and hatred directed towards the Babylonians, who had destroyed Judah and taken its leaders into captivity. This text's inclusion in the Bible has always reflected for me the power and strength of Scripture. We know that our holy texts were edited as they were collected—yet nobody ever saw fit to excise this verse. Of course, there are lots of things in both the Old and New Testaments that we moderns would quickly expunge, but this verse, calling for infanticide, seems to inhabit its own special, dark place.

Would that this verse were not part of the Psalter! But it is. And to me the Truth of the Bible is reflected in its honesty, as the ugliest of human behavior and emotion is contained in the witness of our forebears, forcing us to confront our own worst impulses, our own unhealed wounds, our own sense of alienation.

As we gather around the Lord's Table to share the bread and the cup, we do so with billions of other Christians around the world, people

COMMITTEE NOTES

CHURCH COUNCIL

Reporting to Council for the **Personnel Committee**, Steve Silver discussed a proposal for increasing Henry Danaher's compensation and growing the music program. Henry's request for a salary increase is based on standards set by the American Guild of Organists and on a comparison with other church musician positions in the Upper Valley (a recent search in Thetford, for example, a congregation that is smaller than FCC).

His plans for enhancing the music program include regularizing an instrumental ensemble for jazz, gospel, and folk music; inviting additional singers to supplement our choir on a more systematic basis; and dedicating a space downstairs for consistent use by instrumental instructors as a practice and lesson room.

Steve emphasized the Personnel Committee's agreement that keeping Henry is imperative, considering his contributions to worship and music over the past two years and his collaborative relationships with the rest of the church staff. Several affirmed this opinion and recognized Henry's efforts and achievements. Council unanimously approved a plan to raise the Music Director's annual compensation over time.

Reporting for the **Diaconate**, Barb Jones brought forward the revised resolution for an alternative witness in response to the UCC's "boycott and divest" resolutions. After a brief review of the issue and process, Council unanimously agreed to bring the resolution to the congregation for a vote. Steve Silver suggested October 23 as a date for a special meeting.

Marcia Corkins inquired for Christian Education about the Christmas stable framework that had been removed for repair. John Gilliatt and Steve Teeter will be making the necessary repairs well before Advent.

For the Memorial Gardens, Pete Mason asked whether any further arrangements had been made for Helen Wallace's interment, with some concern about ground freeze within the next couple months. The Church Administrator will follow up with Helen's son Rich.

Brian Clancy reviewed a full concert schedule for the fall, starting with several events in October. Barb Jones asked about the possibility of having more music at the services to be led by the deacons at Genesis Lebanon Center in November.

John Gilliatt reviewed the Board of Governors' ongoing and pending projects. Several estimates will be received in the next month. In particular, John wanted resolution from Council regarding funding of the Sanctuary painting project. After brief discussion of the color scheme and other minor aspects of work in the Sanctuary, Council returned to the funding question and unanimously agreed to use a

bequest from the estate of Ginee Hough for the main Sanctuary and altar portions of the painting, postponing the rear section until further funding is identified.

John also noted that the kitchen water-heater project, after much discussion of its cost and power source, would ideally be finished in time for Thanksgiving. An energy audit will also be conducted this fall. Another improvement under consideration is the purchase of an AED, for which Nan Parsons is investigating grant support. Pete Mason pointed out that gifts given in memory of Gordon Place were also intended to support such a purchase.

There will be no fall clean-up day this year. Steve Silver was asked by the Ledyard Charter School about possible service opportunities for its students, and leaf-raking and cleaning up the grounds seemed like ideal tasks for this.

For the Mission & Social Action Committee, Corrine Erskine noted that preparations for the CROP Walk on October 9 were largely in place. And whereas our work project with the Penobscot nation has been postponed, it's possible that we will arrange to work on a local Habitat project.

Corrine noted for Women of the Church that they had reorganized and cleaned out their storage room downstairs. This contributes to a larger, coordinated reorganization of all downstairs spaces, many of which have been cluttered with seldom-used or discarded items. (Another focus of that reorganization would be to improve the storage of FCC's cache of historical documents,

NOTICE OF CONGREGATIONAL MEETING—SUNDAY, OCTOBER 23, 2016

A special meeting of the congregation of First Congregational Church of Lebanon, NH, is hereby called for Sunday, October 23, 2016, immediately following the worship service, for the purpose of voting on the following resolution proposed by the Diaconate:

"The Diaconate and Church Council recommend that the church vote to offer an alternative witness locally, regionally, and nationally to the resolutions of the 30th General Synod of the United Church of Christ (UCC) and the New Hampshire Conference (NHC) to 'boycott and divest' from companies doing business in the West Bank, and to the process that led to these resolutions.

- We affirm that First Congregational Church of Lebanon does not support the UCC's partisan resolutions in favor of boycott and divestment, which can make peace harder to achieve.
- We call upon the UCC instead to take an active role as true peacemakers, working to develop ties with and encourage **both sides**, acknowledging that the best future for **all** residents of the Middle East is a peaceful future.
- We ask that future UCC actions on the Middle East reflect these peacemaking principles; refrain from positions favoring one side over another; acknowledge the rights of all peoples to live with peace, justice, freedom, and dignity; and incorporate diverse perspectives and robust, open, and inclusive debate in its decision processes."

now inadequately kept in file cabinets in the boiler anteroom.)

The WOC has decided to postpone its "Nearly New" sale of Christmas decorations until next year, as not enough items have been received to justify the sale this year. The group has also investigated options for Sanctuary window treatments, and Council generally felt that a congregational survey of a few alternatives would be advisable.

In his pastor's report, Steve Silver expressed gratitude not only for summer vacation time but also for his return to our pulpit. He noted the start of the program year with two special services, a commemorative liturgy for the 15th anniversary of September 11 and Kick-off Sunday the following week.

He also proudly noted our church's role in the annual Wings of Hope event. He has begun planning for

both the ecumenical Thanksgiving service and Advent and Christmas.

Steve planned to attend the NHC-UCC's clergy convocation in Maine, a vital time of learning, prayer, and fellowship; he also will join the Horton Center retreat but return early to lead worship on 9/25. In his service of the wider church, he is presiding over two installation services and an ecclesiastical council this fall.




