The Pastoral Perspective

Each morning from Monday through Saturday at 8:00, a small group of people gather in the Chantry Chapel in St. Thomas Episcopal Church at the corner of Fifth Avenue and 53rd Street in Manhattan to share the Eucharist. The service is thoroughly Anglo-Catholic: the priest, wearing an impressive, multicolored chasuble, distributes wafers to communicants; the acolyte offers the wine-filled chalice; the liturgy, replete with "thous" and "thees" and "thines," is drawn from the 1928 Book of Common Prayer. It is all utterly un-Congregational, and whenever I'm in New York, I look forward to participating. This different way of doing things challenges my assumptions, refreshes my experience, and reminds me that there is more than one way to worship the Lord. Plus, there's the rumble of the subway.

There's something gloriously, incongruously wonderful about the muffled roar of the E or M train providing a background to the intonations of the Nicene Creed or Lord's Prayer amidst the splendor of a High French Gothic-Revival church. Delightfully, to me at least, the sound of a 20th-century engineering triumph within the confines of a medieval worship space is a gift, a welcome reminder that the One we worship and the Gospel we share are not confined to one era or place. Instead, the great works of God, particularly as made know to us in Jesus Christ, transcend any and all barriers. I find this knowledge to be immensely comforting.

We hear a lot these days about the potential perils of Big Data. In times past it was Big Oil or Big Pharma that we needed to fear. And let us not forget the anxieties provoked by Big Government, most famously personified by George Orwell in the figure of Big Brother. All of these "Bigs" point to forces or entities that are bent on controlling our world and, in the process, disempowering and disenfranchising you and me. It's possible to be left feeling helpless, impotent, and unimportant.



But we need not lose heart. For bigger than all of these is God, who truly is grander, more awesome and amazing than we can imagine. He has made the universe and all in it—and he has chosen to know each of us. That's remarkable, and should be a source of inspiration and encouragement to us all.

Scripture asserts repeatedly that God is always with his people. Sometime he does this in ways one might expect of the Deity: before the assembly in a great, roiling thunderhead that envelops a mountaintop, or as a mighty pillar of smoke and fire that guides a liberated people from bondage, through the wilderness, and into freedom. Other times, he will make himself known in the most surprising and unexpected of places, like in the subterranean rumble of the subway train or when two or three gather around the table to share a meal in his name. But present he will be, offering us strength and power and grace so that we may never forget that he has chosen us to live fully into the promise of his beautiful, blessed new creation.

OUR CHURCH'S "ATTIC"

There's not much in FCC's attic, such as it is—the space over our Sanctuary contains little more than roof and ceiling structure, and our building has no other truly usable attic space. But in the basement, closets, and other areas of the church building, we do possess a variety of artifacts from our past, from disused signs and old prints to meeting minutes. Much of this treasure was displayed a couple years ago, and while some was identified, repurposed, tossed, or otherwise dealt with, a significant cache of our historical objects and records remains to be sorted and catalogued.

A late-July article in the *New York Times* explored this very dilemma. The Congregational Library in Boston seems an obvious ally in considering the stewardship of our historical records, mainly because FCC supports it financially and Steve Silver serves on its board. But there is still much to be done!


Families are strongly encouraged to come!
