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The Pastoral Perspective

In less than three weeks we'll join together on Easter morning to celebrate in song, word, and sacrament the resurrection of Jesus two millennia ago. We will do this believing, with the Christian church throughout the ages, that the resurrection was an actual, physical event in history, something that occurred in a particular place at a moment in time—like the signing of the Declaration of Independence, the invention of penicillin, or the Red Sox victory over St. Louis in the 2004 World Series.

Yet as we gather to rejoice over a miraculous, history-changing event of long ago, we are simultaneously celebrating something that the Christian church, as reflected in its liturgical calendar, treats as an annual recurrence. In Colburn Park at sunrise, and in our flower-bedecked sanctuary four hours later, we will proclaim not "He rose!" but "He is Risen!" We will proclaim that what happened long ago is happening right now—and will happen again. The Resurrection is not simply ancient history; it is our present reality and it is our future.

As Christians, we confess that God's new creation has been, is being, and will be revealed in Jesus Christ. Looking around our world, we may not see evidence of good besting evil, of hope trumping despair, of life victorious over death, but it is there. God is at work doing a new thing. We will celebrate this truth on Easter morning. We will give thanks for what God has done and what he continues to do. And we will rejoice that we are part of God's ongoing, grace-filled activity, as God reveals his new creation.

On Easter Day we will once again encounter a fundamental, powerful truth about God's new creation: it does not function by the rules of the old. We live in a linear world, with events that have transpired, events that are unfolding, and events that have yet to occur. This kind of time is known within the church as *chronos* time: the past leads to the present that in turn will lead to the future. But God, as creator of the universe, is not bound by *chronos* time; instead, his actions are defined by *kairos* time, in which it is possible for things to have happened and to have not yet happened. COMMITTEE NOTES

BOARD OF GOVERNORS

With prior approval of Council, the Board of Governors signed a contract with Don Collins and High Meadow Builders to scrape and paint the east side of the church building later this spring. The contract is for just over \$17,000. This will complete the exterior painting of the church.

The Board has addressed an issue of low water pressure to the main kitchen sink and dishwasher. Three plumbers have looked at the situation and submitted bids, but complications have arisen to require further assessment—namely, the need for a mixing valve and the related question of how best to heat water for the two bathrooms.

Jon Scott spoke briefly to the Board about the high cost of heating the church and how committees might work together to lower fuel and usage costs. Information on energy audits was given to all members for possible future consideration.

The carpet in the sanctuary and narthex will be cleaned prior to Holy Week by Elite Cleaners.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Our annual **Children's Day** this year is **June 8**. Children will once again lead worship that morning, and there will be refreshments

and an exhibit in the Parish Hall showing all that the children have learned during the year in church school. Kids will wear costumes and share projects exploring the theme of "Life in Biblical Times." Please plan to have your children participate in some way—and prepare to celebrate!

CHURCH COUNCIL

At the March Council meeting Todd Heatherton reviewed our budget figures through February. He pointed out that the Treasury still "owes itself" some funds and reported that heating costs are still high, prompting discussion of how we heat the church. Todd also commended Check-Write, our payroll service, for improving the monthly payroll process.

While discussing Ruth Friend's compensation for directing the choir during this interim period between organist/directors, Todd suggested the complexities of paying church members for some responsibilities while relying on volunteers for others. Council agreed that it would be advisable to draft a description spelling out compensation and its limitation to the interim period.

Brian Clancy updated Council on the search for a **permanent organist and choir director**. Despite widespread distribution of the position listing, we have received few serious applications.

Brian continues to welcome any suggestions and help in posting the job listing, and he's tried to assess the position in terms of the American Guild of Organists' standards for time requirements and compensation, in order to align it appropriately within the church music profession.

Jennifer Grant reviewed the **Deacons'** February discussion of a proposed amendment to the clause in our by-laws that outlines Diaconate membership. She characterized the discussion as agreeable and productive, noting a general consensus to encourage gender balance and youth representation without requiring them, since these aren't always possible. Jennifer presented the Diaconate's preferred version of the amendment, and Council unanimously approved it for a vote at a congregational meeting called for that purpose, according to the church by-laws. (Please see the meeting warrant on Page 7.)

On behalf of **Nominating** chair Amy Driscoll, Barry Schuster proposed two minor changes in committee membership. First, Pete Mason volunteered to fill a vacancy on Board of Governors. Second, as Barb Jones expressed interest in serving on the Pastoral Relations Committee, a proposal was made whereby Nan Parsons, currently the at-large member of the PRC, would cede this spot to Barb but remain on the PRC as

the representative of the Board of Governors. Council unanimously approved both changes.

Pete Mason reported that the **Memorial Gardens Committee** will be planting the gardens in front and side of the building as soon as spring weather permits.

After recognizing that Corrine Erskine is now chair of **Mission** and Social Action, Jon Scott reported for both that committee and Stewardship. Plans for FCC to participate in a mission trip to El Salvador with Epilogos in October are taking shape. The committee hopes that an annual calendar can be established for the Community Dinner, to get volunteer commitments earlier. The committee has considered the issue of cold-weather shelter in the area, but it determined that it was neither necessary or feasible at this time to consider offering the church facility for such a purpose.

Lastly, Barry Schuster encouraged everyone to submit any potential discussion items prior to future meetings, so that at least a basic agenda might be circulated to all Council members in advance.

DIACONATE

Jennifer Grant opened the March Diaconate meeting by asking for contributions to a "prayer pot." Barb Teeter reported for **Called to Care** that the Hembergers are settled in Florida, where Mike is dealing with Alzheimer's. Prayers were also received for Corrine Erskine's son K. C. in Texas, and for Corrine as she visited him.

Rev. Steve Silver reported that the ecumenical **Ash Wednesday** service at First Baptist Church was successful, with our church well represented. This was the first time in many years that the Baptists participated.

Steve is offering a four-week Lenten sermon series, entitled "Where Are You?", exploring the challenges of faith through the stories of four biblical characters. For the duration of the series, we will read just one lesson from Scripture; weekly lectionary readings will be included in the bulletin. Steve is also offering a three-week Adult Ed series on Jonah. He encouraged the deacons to participate in Holy Week services, noting that there will be many opportunities to provide worship leadership.

In a new meeting activity, "Experiencing the Divine," the deacons considered how and where they perceive God acting in their lives. The discussion asked each deacon whether particular places make them feel closer to God and why, and whether they would consider those places "holy."

The deacons also discussed plans for future **all-church forums**, including one in May on home

funerals. Jennifer thanked Ron Bailey, too, and everyone else who made the "Fire and Ice" event at Ron's house on March 2 such a great experience. A group of seventeen people cooked out and snowshoed, continuing the fellowship and spirituality of the church's "outing club."

Lastly, the deacons reviewed their individual member outreach lists and agreed to provide updates to Jennifer Grant.

COMMITTEE NOTES

NOTICE OF SPECIAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

A special meeting of the congregation of First Congregational Church of Lebanon, NH, is hereby called for Sunday, April 27, 2014, immediately following the worship service, for the purpose of voting on an amendment to the church's CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS.

The amendment concerns Article V, Section 2 of the BY-LAWS, concerning membership of the Diaconate. The current language reads as follows:

"The Diaconate shall consist of six deacons, six deaconesses, and two junior members, all covenant members. Two deacons and two deaconesses shall be elected at each annual meeting for a term of three years. Two junior deacons or deaconesses (preferably one of each) shall be elected at each annual meeting for a term of one year."

The amended language, proposed by the Diaconate and unanimously approved by Church Council for a congregational vote, reads as follows:

"The Diaconate shall consist of twelve deacons, all covenant members and, when possible, equally balanced between men and women. Four deacons shall be elected at each annual meeting for a term of three years. The Diaconate may also include as many as two youth deacons, preferably covenant members, who shall be elected at the annual meeting for a term of one year."
