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The Pastoral Perspective

A few days ago I settled into my seat in Dartmouth's Loew Auditorium and enjoyed a four-and-a-half-hour-long live broadcast from New York of Mozart's *Idomeneo*. The conducting was sublime, the performances powerful. It was a grand way to spend a Saturday. However, I will note that this is the age of Twitter, with its 140-character-long messages, and there I was, sitting in a room for the better part of an afternoon watching costumed people sing a version of an ancient Greek story in Italian. So perhaps I was a bit behind the times. But I was also, I will note, being subversive.

Now, watching the Met's simulcast wasn't the only time I was subversive that weekend. The same could be said of what I did the following morning: I came to church. If you come to church, you're subversive, too. Singing all those old hymns. Saying those ancient prayers. Doing what your forebears and their forebears and the forebears of their forebears did; it all runs counter to what society says is important—and it's been this way for 2,000 years.

Do you think of yourself as subversive? In the end, it doesn't matter. I don't know that Jesus did. However, I'm pretty confident that he thought of himself as being faithful, as being determined to place his trust in the Father, the one who created the universe and all in it, regardless of the cost. Later in April, we celebrate this commitment, fully aware of just what Jesus was willing to do to devote his life to God—and blessed by the knowledge of what it was that God did with his Son's sacrificial act.

The Christian church through its witness claims that the Resurrection is the single most subversive action in all of history. Through his victory on the cross, God upended every sure thing in this world, giving the last word to love and to life. At times in our lives it may seem like hate and death have prevailed. But the truth is otherwise, and we are called to remember this event and to share this news with one another and the wider community. We'll do that on Easter, when

COMMITTEE NOTES

CHURCH COUNCIL

Corrine Erskine reported for **Mission and Social Action** that Twin Pines Housing Trust may buy a boarding house behind the Carter building, in order to help with Lebanon's affordable-housing problem, and FCC can look at ways to help. UVIP is moving forward with an alternativelending program and will host a forum at FCC on aging with dignity, after worship on April 30. Kathy Beckett is also investigating the possibility of our hosting a Syrian refugee film here.

For the **Board of Governors**, John Gilliatt reported on recent repairs and maintenance. The kitchen range and oven have been cleaned. Based on the recently completed energy audit, we've installed weather stripping and sealed the Parlor chimney; more weather stripping and insulation projects are planned. John installed our two AED units, for which a training session will be held after worship on April 2. A handrail prototype has been developed for the altar steps, with a final version in progress. The front portico deck will be repaired when the weather warms, and cracks in the front walk will be sealed. The Spring Clean-Up is scheduled for Saturday, May 13.

The **Diaconate** did not meet in February due to weather; they held an organizational meeting in March. Barb Jones will continue as chair, Barb Teeter as vice-chair, and Kathy Beckett as secretary. Terry Ellison was elected Treasurer (pending his acceptance), in hopes of facilitating the consolidation of all church accounts in the Treasury.

Barb Jones reported on **plans for sabbatical coverage** following Steve Silver's last Sunday on May 14. Kevin Schwartz will preach three Sundays (5/21, 5/28, 6/11), Heidi Hoskin one (6/4). Jo Shelnutt will be here

The Board of Governors has just installed two new AED units, one each in the Sanctuary and Parish Hall. Bill Wood of the NH Bureau of Emergency Medical Services led a training session on April 2, attended by about twenty members of the congregation.

for the remaining three months, from June 18 through September 10. Barb and Ginger Smith, joined in part by Brian Clancy, had a good meeting with Jo about the interim period; the Deacons enthusiastically recommended that she be hired. Council unanimously approved her appointment.

The Deacons are also developing a new lay pastoral-care ministry. Jon Scott mentioned that a forum will be offered after worship on Palm Sunday to recruit people to the Prayer Team, and the Diaconate would use information to engage people, eventually building out the program to include home visits.

Council was reminded that it needs to address **childcare coverage**. Linda Oronte noted that Ashley has been concerned about not having a partner. Corrine has inquired at Hartford High School, but nobody has reached out to church yet; she will contact them again. Jon Scott suggested outreach to Dartmouth childcare and to CRREL; Linda also suggested River Valley CC's childcare program. Jon asked if we could raise childcare pay to \$20 for 1.5 hours (from the current \$15) to attract candidates.

Marcia Corkins noted that **Christian Education** is planning its Easter egg hunt. There will be a puppet show offered to all families on Saturday, May 20, at 2:00 pm. Christian Ed is also preparing for its annual Children's Sunday exhibit in June.

For **Stewardship**, Jon Scott sought Council's feedback regarding the possibility of making automatic payments available, as we continue to see a drop in offering collections during the summer. Jon asked whether he could investigate this; Council approved. He will follow up with the Finance Committee.

In his **Pastor's Report**, Steve noted his regular activities of preaching, pastoral care, and general ministry. He's planning for our service of rededication in the Sanctuary on April 2 and Holy Week from April 9 (Palm Sunday) through Easter on the 16th. (It was earlier noted that Men's Fellowship, led by Jon Scott and Larry Doyle, will organize the Easter breakfast after the Sunrise Service.) Steve has been involved in plans for his sabbatical, the duration of which has now been set as May 15 through September 10.

Steve Silver's Sabbatical Begins May 15

As most everyone is aware, the Rev. Steve Silver will be taking his well-earned sabbatical this summer. His plans are still evolving, but they will include considerable study, writing, and related travel.

Steve will lead worship as always on Sunday, May 14, but he then will be officially away from FCC until Monday, September 11. Kevin Schwartz and Heidi Hoskin will preach Sundays through June 11, after which we are fortunate that the Rev. Jo Shelnutt will serve as Interim Pastor through the remainder of the summer.

COMMITTEE NOTES

DIACONATE

At their March meeting, the Deacons elected officers for the coming year and discussed changing their regular meeting day to the first Wednesday of the month. They also approved the purchase of additional food and gas cards for the Open Door Ministry.

The Deacons all enthusiastically approved the Rev. Jo Shelnutt to act as Interim Minister during Steve's sabbatical, pending Council approval. Rev. Shelnutt's long association with FCC was noted, and she may well be involved with FCC's musical drama camp in late August. Jo's duties as Interim Minister include preaching, administering Communion, and providing emergency pastoral care. She will begin her time here on June 18, and the Deacons will meet with her to discuss how they can help serve the FCC community. Steve will also speak with both Jo and Kevin Schwartz, who will also offer service to FCC during the sabbatical. Steve will seek advice regarding the terms of violating sabbatical under special circumstances.

The Diaconate will lead **worship services at Genesis** on Sunday afternoons during the month of November, as they did last fall.

Steve Silver asked the Diaconate for feedback regarding a request for the **use of church space**. The Upper Valley Democrats asked to use the Parish Hall for an issue-oriented forum. The Deacons strongly advised against this request, due to concerns that FCC might be seen as affiliated with a particular political party. It was suggested that Council establish a policy for such requests.

Biff Simpson stated that **Movie Night** has evolved into the offering of a "kids' movie" every two months. He emphasized that others need to be trained to set up for the movies. Snacks and drinks will be offered. The next movie to be shown will be *Milo and Otis*, on April 8.

Biff also informed the Deacons of two successful **Scouting** events—a camp-out for the Boy Scouts and the annual Blue and Gold Banquet for the Cub Scouts. Steve Silver reported on a UVIP group that is developing an alternative to car-title lending with the assistance of Mascoma Bank. The program, which depends on \$25,000 in seed money to start, will also require loan recipients to participate in financial coaching. UVIP is coordinating a **forum and potluck on end-of-life planning** on April 30 after worship, led by Cayla Dyer, Lead Organizer for UVIP, assisted by Steve Teeter, Ron Bailey, and Carolin Bassett.

In consideration of our lay pastoralcare ministry ("Umbrella of Caring"), the Deacons hope that more people will become involved in FCC's Praver Circle. Steve Silver will lead a Prayer Forum after worship on Palm Sunday. Deb Scott has been working on a system for receiving prayer requests. Related concerns include ensuring that names are transferred from prayer lists, how to bridge from prayer to a person we encounter during and after worship, and the need for a point person for this ministry. These issues will be discussed during April's meeting.
