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#### The Pastoral Perspective

The Feast of the Resurrection is behind us, but Eastertide continues right through Pentecost on May 20. This season of the church recalls the appearances of the Risen Christ to the disciples and others among the faithful, in the wake of the miracle of the empty tomb. It will end only when we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit and the birth of the Church on Pentecost. And then what? Months of Ordinary Time, until we once again reach Advent and begin telling the story once again.

So what? Why do we do this? Why relive this cycle endlessly?

Part of it is because we are a people bound in time and a people who remember things through reenactment. Doing something is more powerful than simply recalling it. Part of it is so that the story may remain fresh. Our hope is that in living out the liturgy, we may discover new things and gain a deeper appreciation of what God in Christ has done for us. And part of it is because we just don't get it. Despite attending Sunday school, despite all of the preaching, the devotionals, the art, the music, I'm not convinced we ever truly get what God has done for us in Jesus.

And, honestly, how can we? The love and grace that God has showered on us are really remarkable, something that is unearned. But that doesn't matter to God: he chose, and chooses, to give it to us anyway. You in your life may not feel it. But it's there. Or, you feel it so much that you unintentionally take it for granted, or you are in danger of missing it. None of this is to say you're doing anything wrong, or that you are "bad."

God knows we need some help accepting his gift. That was why he came to us in Jesus. And that is why the Spirit makes itself known in the church and through the saints whom we have come to know through their many actions and selfless dedication, the people who serve on committees, who visit the ill and lonely, who help with worship, and who are kind to the stranger.

#### COMMITTEE NOTES

#### **BOARD OF GOVERNORS**

At the March meeting of Board of Governors, John Gilliatt reported that a recent inspection of the **Parsonage** chimney determined that it requires nothing except to be cleaned next year. With that cost avoided, it was suggested that we instead get an energy audit of the Parsonage. Walter Scott suggested using the local Weatherize Lebanon campaign, which can lower the cost of the audit significantly.

John is working on getting an estimate for updating the **kitchen** cabinets. Many who use the kitchen are interested in more comprehensive renovations, including the oven and range, the floors and countertops, the sink, and other appliances and equipment. Walter Scott will seek estimates for these possibilities.

Walter is also investigating options for installing an **elevator** to improve accessibility in our building. In this we will consider all options, from just a chair that goes up and down the stairs to a full addition to house the elevator.

We have received an estimate for refinishing the **Sanctuary floor**, but it excludes the significant cost of

moving pews out of the way, which will have to be accounted for. The Board is also assessing carpeting estimates, which vary considerably based on the type of carpet.

The Board determined that the annual **Spring Clean-up** will occur somewhat later this year, on June 2. We will solicit ideas about what we should accomplish that day. The Board will also be addressing the storage of historical records and documents, currently kept in the basement utility room but in need of more stable, secure storage.

#### CHURCH COUNCIL

At Council in March Corrine Erskine reported for Mission and Social Action that about twenty-five people came to the open discussion about **immigration** on March 18. We will be getting a banner that welcomes immigrants to FCC, pull together resources, and have another meeting. Steve Silver will also be going to the Listen board.

Valerie Nevel noted for the **Trustees** that we had received our annual distribution from the Waldo Trust. **Treasurer** Terry Ellison has been

monitoring church funds closely and noted that we need to transfer money from Trustee accounts. He would like Council to look at how we contemplate our capital budget, not just for the next year but for two or three years in advance.

Pete Mason reported for **Memorial Gardens** Committee that Ginger Smith will be interred in the front garden later in the year.

Barb Teeter reported on a brief **Diaconate** meeting in March with no major issues. The Deacons planned for Holy Week and Easter and talked about what they might do to follow up on our being a gun-

free zone. We will also receive new members on April 22, with an orientation the previous Sunday.

John Gilliatt reported for the Board of Governors that another chimney expert had been called to the Parsonage for a second opinion, and further work is not needed on the chimney. We are also looking for an energy auditor for the Parsonage; Corrine offered a list of options from Vital Communities. The Board has also cleaned up the utility space in the church basement and the custodial closet, which will need insulation. John reported that the interior insulation would be a priority (once the closet is cleaned), but this work has not vet been scheduled.

#### DIACONATE

Barb Teeter opened the Deacons' meeting in March with a warm remembrance of Ginger Smith, who had passed away a few days earlier. The group briefly discussed the need to find a successor for her on the Diaconate.

New Diaconate Treasurer Alyson Danyew-Ellison reported a healthy balance in the Deacons' Fund. It was unanimously agreed to purchase additional gas and food cards for the Open Door Ministry. Alyson also asked whether the offering collection should remain the responsibility of the Deacon of the Month. After some discussion, the group agreed that it would. Rev. Steve Silver reported that in addition to his usual ministerial activities, he was planning for Holy Week and Easter. He especially sought Diaconate participation in the Maundy Thursday service. He also invited the Deacons to join the congregational discussion about immigration after worship on Sunday, March 18. The Deacons also discussed how they might take action in light of Council's recent decision to declare our church a gun-free zone.

Lastly, it was decided that the church would offer to receive new members on Sunday, April 22. Deacons were asked to participate in an informal new-member orientation after worship on April 15.

### Volunteer at David's House

David's House is the dream of a little boy named David Cyr, who passed away in 1984 after struggling with acute leukemia. During his treatments at the children's hospital in Hanover, David and his father Dick met families who were determined not to leave their sick

children but had nowhere to stay locally and couldn't afford a hotel. Soon after David's passing, his parents and friends began raising funds to establish David's House, which in 32 years has welcomed over 14,000 families from around the world, while their children get the specialized care they need at DHMC next door.

#### What's WIC? Getting to Know One of FCC's Regular Guests

For almost four years, First Congregational Church has hosted twicemonthly clinics of New Hampshire's Women, Infants, and Children Program—popularly known as WIC. Subject to certain income guidelines, families can obtain free health screenings, nutritional education and advice, breastfeeding support, and service referrals. (And despite the name, fathers routinely utilize WIC services, too!) An itinerant program with limited resources, WIC depends on sites across the state that offer enough space for its clinics at minimal cost.

Practicing responsible healthcare and nutrition can be challenging for any family, but without WIC's support it would be impossible for many parents with limited means, working multiple jobs. WIC offers them vital assistance, and they in turn are tremendously grateful. "Thanks to WIC," says a typical client, "my children's health is on track."

By offering this important program the space it needs, our congregation extends the love and compassion that Christ modeled and asked us to share with each other.

This statefunded resource offers up to \$50 worth of food monthly to anyone aged 60 years or older who needs help in stretching

their food budget.
