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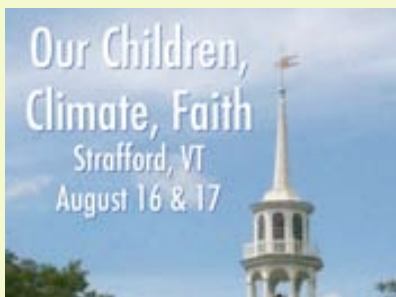
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The Pastoral Perspective

What do you think about when you hear the word *farm*? Herds of grazing cows? Red wooden barns? Rows of summer corn ripening in the sun? Old-time values exemplified by hard work? You probably don't think of mainframe computers—but you should. For the government and any number of corporations are busy collecting all sorts of information about you and me, all of which is stored in and analyzed by computers of tremendous power housed in giant facilities known euphemistically as data farms.

The people at the NSA will tell you this is being done for our protection. The folks at Amazon will say it's being done to better meet our needs as consumers. And our "friends" at Facebook will contend that harvesting every last iota of data about us enables the company to better help us connect with others. It's all for the good. It's all being done with our best interests at heart. It's all about us.

Yet.

While it is nice to locate lost acquaintances online, be apprised of a product we will find interesting but had no idea existed, or have those charged with our defense make use of new tools to anticipate and neutralize threats, we know that those collecting all of this data do so to know us not as unique persons but as consumers, not as beloved individuals but as data points in a threat-analysis matrix.

There is, however, another who knows all about us, who is familiar with the most intimate details of our lives. The prophet Jeremiah was familiar with him, recounting in what we know as chapter four of his book:

Now the word of the Lord came to me saying, "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, and before you were born I consecrated you; I appointed you a prophet to the nations." Then I said, "Ah, Lord God! Truly I do not know how to speak, for I am only a boy." But the

Lord said to me, “Do not say, ‘I am only a boy’; for you shall go to all to whom I send you, and you shall speak whatever I command you. Do not be afraid of them, for I am with you to deliver you, says the Lord.” (Jer. 1:4-8)

With these words Jeremiah begins his account of his call. The prophet, we learn, was chosen by One who has known him since before he was born, who is familiar with his inmost secrets and failings, yet who trusts him implicitly with great work.

Implicit in Jeremiah’s call was the knowledge that there is nowhere, no way to hide from God. Yet rather than feel violated or threatened, as we might by today’s seemingly all-knowing holders of Big Data, Jeremiah is comforted by God’s familiarity with him—and we can be, too. Like Jeremiah, despite our manifold failings, we are loved by the Creator of the Universe. We mess up, yet he still cherishes each of us, and always will.

Big data may be a big deal, presenting the potential to change the way our government delivers services, including the provision of security, or the manner in which companies interact with customers, offering ever better commercial experiences. An unintended consequence, though, is that it can make the individual seem pretty small. All our vital statistics, our interests, our passions, our wants, reduced to a series of ones and zeroes that are sliced, diced, and turned every which way by people we don’t know and never will.

Fortunately, there is something even bigger than Big Data, and that is God, the One who has known each of us since before the beginning, who rejoices in our individuality, who calls us to be a part of his kingdom, who loves us, holds us, and empowers us.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

CHURCH COUNCIL

At its meeting in July, Council learned that the **Board of Governors** has been reduced to three active members. The Board will come to Council for support until this situation is remedied. It was pointed out that the Board may approach church members to fill these positions; if approved by Council, they would serve until the next Annual Meeting. Council also discussed the **Nominating Committee's** urgent need for new members. It was agreed that Council should actively invite the congregation to participate on all committees, particularly these two but on others as well.

Warren Belding asked Council to consider how we should proceed with **Nancy Brown's** work. Her first workshop in June was good but, some felt, too general. It was agreed that the congregation seems to want to discuss specifics, to have an honest conversation, and try to resolve particular issues. A neutral time seems preferable to a Sunday, and the idea of using a Council meeting time was widely supported.

The **Trustees** met at the end of May. Invested funds are doing well and meeting expectations. All roofing expenses from the spring have been paid.

Council considered the need for more efficient communication among the Trustees, Council,

and the Treasurer. The Trustees rely on regular information such as monthly financial reports, and Council uses that information to plan for the future. Council also recommended that the **Finance Committee** meet as soon as convenient for its members.

In a related matter, Council discussed alternative methods for paying bills and revisited the ongoing question of opening a church credit-card account.

A discussion also arose about specific, **non-monetary gifts and donations** offered to the church, since it is unclear whether we have a policy for accepting such gifts. The Trustees have a policy for gifts of stock and other financial assets, but not for these situations. John Scott offered to draft something on this subject for September.

Todd Heatherton raised the need to transfer **ownership of the church website**. We're currently signed up for five years, but this needs to be addressed. There are no budgetary issues, since this costs only about \$70 annually.

The **Diaconate** organized an all-church hike on June 23, which

went very well. On the weekend of September 27-29 there will be a retreat at the Horton Center, in collaboration with two other churches. It is hoped that this retreat will engage our youth as well as adults.

The deacons have also discussed the next after-church **Forum and Potluck**, although September's church schedule is complicated. The purpose would be to have committee representatives speak, to educate the congregation about each committee's function and invite participation. (See related notes from Stewardship Committee about its proposed inventory of congregational interests and talents.)

Pete Mason is no longer chair of the **Safety Committee**; new co-chairs are Linda Oronte and Barb Jones. In a related issue, Valerie Nevel noted the need to develop guidelines for addressing sexual harassment and toxic work space, including options for a dual reporting process. The Council proposed that the Diaconate offer education on these topics.

The **Music Committee** will next meet in September. The recent

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Classicopia series finished well, but greater concert attendance would be preferable, especially among church members, since the larger community seems to enjoy these concerts thoroughly. This fall the committee will survey the congregation about the role of music in worship, the Music at the Meetinghouse series, church choir, and other issues of music and ministry.

Women's Fellowship has had the kitchen stove cleaned. They are also planning to purchase fans for cooling the Sanctuary, as long as the fans are quiet enough. The group is selling pies on July 18 and August 15 at the Lebanon Farmer's Market.

Steve Silver has been busy with worship, pastoral care, and funerals. He will be taking study leave and vacation in late July and August, and Mark Rowell will preach in his absence. Mark will also be licensed by the Grafton-Orange Association to give communion.

Steve encouraged everyone to approach Mark with constructive feedback on his preaching and pastoral leadership, as he continues working toward ordination.

In October Steve will attend the annual meeting of the UCC Historical Council in Cleveland.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Church School's Kick-off Sunday will be September 9. Classes will resume that day, followed by pizza lunch and other surprises.

The first theme of the Church School year is "Life in Biblical Times." Children will learn about family life, occupations, clothing, food, money, worship, festivals, animals, plants, and music. Once they've finished exploring this theme, the children will share what they've learned at a special event, with crafts, illustrations, demonstrations, and music.

The committee will meet next on August 21 at 7:00.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

MISSION AND SOCIAL ACTION COMMITTEE

The Mission and Social Action Committee has begun to build a group for a trip to El Salvador with Epilogos, either on our own or in conjunction with another group. The church has made a donation of scholarship funds, and we will hear in the fall how it has been applied to elementary school students. The Salvadoran government has now promised free elementary school tuition, so the money will go toward the students' clothing, books, and other support costs. We have one donor who will support a single high-school student, establishing greater personal contact.

The committee also intends to report on our project to support Second Growth, a commitment we made last year.

Plans for the fall include FCC's annual participation in the Upper Valley Crop Walk, this year on Sunday, October 6. The committee will meet next on September 15 after worship.

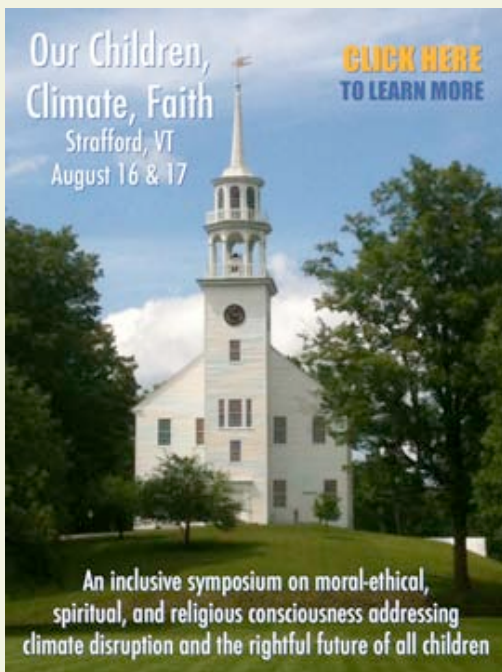
