



# The Pastoral Perspective

Have you seen *Won't You Be My Neighbor?* This documentary is a 94-minute homage to the late Fred Rogers, known to most people as the host of the TV show about his eponymous neighborhood and to some as a Presbyterian minister. Yes, that's right—Mr. Rogers was actually the Rev. Rogers. But we'll get to that.

The film recounts the story of Fred Rogers, his call to ministry, his interest in child development and education, his recognition of the power—



and peril—of the then-still-new medium of television, and the decadeslong saga of his show. The program was slow-paced, warm, and very much at odds with the modern zeitgeist that esteems an ever-faster, ever-noisier world. Most important, *Mr. Rogers' Neighborhood* treated kids with respect, even as it delved into the deep and sometimes turbulent waters of topics like friendship, self-esteem, divorce, disability, race relations, and even assassination in the wake of Robert F. Kennedy's murder. In his own way, Mr. Rogers was both reassuring and subversive.

While admiring, the film is no hagiography. Fred Rogers, like every one of us, had his quirks and failings, which are not hidden from the viewer. But interviews with his family, his friends, his colleagues, filmed testimony before Congress, and footage from his long-running show make clear just what a good, decent, and kind man he was, especially in the face of mean-spirited detractors.

As we try to navigate an ornery period in our national life, one where civility is in short supply, we can draw inspiration from Mr. Rogers' example. We can ask what we can do to be good neighbors. To whom might we extend hospitality? To whom might we offer help, or a ride to DHMC, or help with chores, or simple companionship? As we consider what we might do, we should remember that answering the question "Won't you be my neighbor?" is not just a matter of good manners; it's a vocational activity, part of being a faithful Christian. I believe that this is what made Mr. Rogers' neighborhood Rev. Rogers' ministry.

# COMMITTEE NOTES

### BOARD OF GOVERNORS

The Board of Governors has been tending to various projects during the summer. A new lighting sconce has been installed in the **balcony stairwell**, making those stairs much safer for evening events. Brandon Mason has been working with an insulation contractor to provide an estimate for **insulating the church** building in multiple phases. We are expecting funding from Liberty Utilities for an energy audit in the fall; an audit cannot be conducted until colder weather, in any case.

The Board has also discussed the challenges of sealing the cracks in the **front walkway**, debating the merits of caulk-style and liquid fillers, patches, and even concrete. John Gilliatt has followed up with a blacktop company. We are also engaging High Meadow Builders to repair the crack in the ceiling plaster in the Parish Hall.

John has met with consultants at LaValley's about **kitchen renovations**, determining that we could "refresh" the kitchen with repainting, new cabinets, flooring, and countertops

for about \$5,000. Should we decide on a more extensive renovation, Walter Scott has consulted with Amy Driscoll and others about equipment and features we might ideally want in a newly redesigned kitchen. Walter has also met with a contractor about the installation of an elevator, which would involve considerable expense for the unit alone, even without the shaft and entry structure required to house it.

The Board is still pursuing estimates for **refinishing the Sanctuary floor**. The major logistical complication here is how to handle the pews during the project, as it is difficult and expensive to remove the pews entirely. There's also the question of when during the year would be best for this project, as it would make the Sanctuary unavailable for a significant period of time. Concurrently, we will need to consider the related expenses of new carpeting and pew cushions as well, which will take time.

### DIACONATE

At their June meeting the Deacons tended to various **pastoral care items** and reaffirmed the value of reaching out to our congregation members with cards and calls. Children especially can learn, grow, and form an early connection with the church by receiving this support. The Church Administrator helped to update the individual member lists assigned to each deacon.

The Diaconate continues to fund the **Open Door Ministry,** despite the merger of the Deacons' Fund with the general treasury. So far in 2018, we have funded \$4,000 worth of food and gas cards.

### A CAMPAIGN FOR FIRST CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH OF LEBANON Celebrating 250 Years of Our Congregation

Church Council is planning for a fundraising campaign during our congregation's 250th anniversary year, beginning in September. A campaign committee has begun to look at feasibility, the case for support, and the needs and dreams we wish to fund. ## COMMITTEE NOTES

The Deacons and Steve Silver hope to encourage more **lay participation in worship**, and all are welcome. Active solicitation of volunteers is needed to support this effort. It was also noted that raised awareness about using discretion when sharing Joys and Concerns seemed to be having a positive effect. Additional prayer shawls have now been blessed in worship, too.

Questions remain about how and when we might be able to record **worship services on video**. Concerns include technical and logistical challenges and the securing of personal permissions. Similarly, it was noted that the Sanctuary sound system, wireless microphone, and hearing-aid units require some maintenance. Biff Simpson will be investigating these issues.

As the group plans for **supporting Eliot Fay** in his discernment process for ordination, Bob Gerlach, Kathy Beckett, and Barb Jones volunteered to serve as the committee that will work with Eliot for the duration of this process. Sue Pratt, having been a pastor's wife, offered to support Eliot's wife Jessie.

Barb Jones and Sue Pratt recently attended a seminar sponsored by **Mental Health First Aid**. They highly recommended it to others for when similar seminars may be offered in the future.

In lieu of their monthly dates, the Deacons met at the end of July for a **barbecue and potluck** at Susan Montmagny's home. (*Notes from that meeting will appear next month.*)

### Call for Nominations — 7th Annual Micah Awards Sponsored by the United Valley Interfaith Project (UVIP)

The prophet Micah calls us to consider what it means to live into God's expectations for us, offering guidance on how to live up to those expectations: "And what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" (*Micah* 6:8)

UVIP's Micah Awards annually recognize local "Micah Heroes" who live into the prophet's words in some exemplary manner—people who contribute time and energy to community service, consistently volunteer themselves to work for a vital cause, and offer their community a living role model of faith in service. Each UVIP member organization is invited to honor its own Micah Hero(es).

All are welcome to nominate up to three members of our congregation who best represent the spirit of the Micah Awards (only our previous winners are ineligible: Ron Bailey, Pete Mason, the Teeters, and Kathy Beckett). The individual with the most votes will be our congregation's Micah Hero for 2018.

A graduate of Pittsburgh Theological Seminary, Fred Rogers was about as Presbyterian as one could be. He knew what it was to be fallen—and what it was to be met by God's grace. He knew that while we all have stumbled, we are all children of the Lord. Perhaps we have failed to be good neighbors in the past. We can always do better in the future. Scripture and an old TV show tell us the same thing: we are never too broken to do God's work.

*Won't You Be My Neighbor* is out of theaters, but will be available on DVD and to stream in September. Maybe we'll watch it at church. In the meantime, let's think about and ask with conviction, "Won't You Be My Neighbor?" And know that to be able to do so is one of the greatest blessings we will ever know.


# **Musical Drama Camp Returns This Month!**

# Musical Drama Camp Returns!

### A Not So Terrible Parable
