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The Pastoral Perspective

The mash-up has been receiving a lot of attention lately thanks to Thanksgivukkah, the once-in-a-lifetime confluence of Thanksgiving and Hanukkah. This joyful, only-in-America marriage of the sacred and secular is but the latest example of a genre in which two distinct entities are blended to make something new. The beauty of the mash-up is that it is protean in its versatility—it can involve not only holidays but music (such as guitar-shredding, Mozart-loving videos on YouTube) and literature (*Pride and Prejudice* and Zombies, for example).

Oh, and did I mention Scripture?

That's right, Scripture. Consider the Nativity and how we recount the stories told by the Evangelists. Mark, of course, doesn't bother with a birth story, and John is, well, John, giving us his wonderful, mystical discourse on the Logos. Both Luke and Matthew offer straightforward narratives of Jesus' birth. Mind you, their tellings differ, and notably: Luke writes of shepherds, Matthew his Magi. Luke mentions nothing about visitors from the East, while Matthew is silent about angelic visitations to men tending to animals in fields beyond Bethlehem. Yet take a moment to look at the average crèche scene, perhaps even the one in your own home, as in the Silver family's, and you'll see shepherds and Magi gathered together around the Christ child.

This meeting of lowly agricultural workers and Oriental sages occurs not only in crèches but in carols, art, and perhaps most powerfully, the popular imagination. And while some might suggest this is a Bad Thing, indicating a lack of proper Biblical literacy, I'd like to suggest that this Gospel mash-up is actually a Good Thing. Now don't get me wrong: I'd like everyone to be familiar with the Lukan and Matthean narratives and their differences. Each is powerful in its own way and offers a unique

COMMITTEE NOTES

A MESSAGE FROM CHURCH COUNCIL

Church Council met on November 19 in executive session with Nancy Brown, to review and clarify complex issues which precipitated our contract with NPB & Associates and to determine our next steps in helping our congregation move forward. Our goal has been, and continues to be, to learn from the past to ensure a healthy, functioning, and vibrant congregation.

While we recognize that incidents experienced by some church members may have been felt or perceived differently by others, we also recognize there are areas in which we need to review and strengthen the way we work together.

We reviewed concerns in the following general categories—issues primarily related to change; issues primarily related to the learning curve of a pastor new to ministry; issues of concern around the role and function of boards, committees, and other groups within the congregation; and general statements of concern.

We discussed the invitation sent to all members of the congregation to engage in a facilitated conversation, either with Steve or with others within the church. It was noted that this is an open-ended invitation—with no time limit. The hope is that accepting this invitation may offer a way for healing to begin, both for those who felt the need to take a break from the life of the church and for any members who have stayed but have lingering issues they wish to address.

We concluded with a commitment to address the issues mentioned above and raised in the contract. I will work with Nancy to prioritize remaining issues. The Council will keep you posted on planned steps in this process as we proceed.

perspective on the birth of Jesus. But when the two are blended, the mash-up makes a powerful theological statement: the Christ child is ready to be approached by the lowly and the powerful, the Jew and the Gentile, in short: anyone and everyone. The One who came to us as an infant, the Lord of Hosts who chose to become incarnate as a baby, did so for all humanity. Not for some of us, but for *all* of us.

The birth narratives remain among the most potent illustrations of why Fact and Truth aren't one and the same. The former points to verifiable data, the latter to something deeper, more profound. When we tell the story of the birth of Jesus and of those who came to worship the Christ child, we are not recounting fact. Instead, we are telling the Truth, the story of how much God loves us, as individuals and as a community. And the Truth doesn't mind a mash-up—as long as it faithfully points to the reality of God's profligate, boundless, healing love for his people.

Report on the 212th Annual Meeting of the NH Conference, UCC

On October 26 Laura Place and I traveled to Concord as annual conference delegates, and these notes do not do justice to the day. The conference theme of "Surprising Joy" was expressed throughout in a variety of ways, beginning with the keynote address by Rev. Talitha Arnold, minister of the United Church of Christ of Santa Fe since 1987. Her message, entitled "Rejoice Always, Pray without Ceasing: Being the Church God Calls You to Be," could have inspired an entire paper on its own.

After a welcome from Associate Conference Minister Rev. Richard Slater and our opening worship service, Laura Sevigny called the business meeting to order. She introduced staff and contractors who provide special services to the Conference, then those who serve on the Planning and Worship Committees. Rev. Kim McKerley introduced a 12-member Zimbabwe delegation, part of the Zimbabwe Ukama Partnership. Forty-three UCC churches in NH are partnered with a Zimbabwean church, and much "surprising joy" comes from these partnerships.

Rev. Gary Shulte spoke on the state of the Conference and introduced our 2014 Mission Income and Spending Plan, basing his message on Hebrews 11:10: "For he looked for a city which hath foundations, whose builder and maker is God." He lifted up youth and young adults as our present and our future in the UCC, despite the relative lack of under-25 conference attendees. Rev. Schulte noted that as we have lost members, some pastors have taken part-time jobs since they are part-time

ministers! All 138 member churches need to support the Conference, each doing its part so that the denomination can thrive.

A representative from the Budget and Finance Committee summarized the 2014 budget, projected to show a \$23,000 loss unless the Horton Center can bring in its proposed revenue. This new ministry hosted only 250 campers this year, 150 short of the minimum to break even. An extension of our Christian Education programs and a wonderful way to strengthen youth ministry, Horton Center cannot continue to exist on nostalgia alone; one has to experience it first hand. A visit there opens children and adults alike to the presence of God and a life in Christ.

Rev. Warren Bouton, chair of the OCWM (Our Church's Wider Mission) Committee, added his own words about Horton Center and discussed OCWM's ability to change lives by strengthening stewardship and missions together. We all seek justice for those who need our collective voice, and the work of the church is to spread the love of God.

The Medicaid resolution was addressed, and we all were encouraged to speak to our NH legislators so that approximately 58,000 lower-income citizens can access healthcare services.

Rev. Slater explained the dissolution of the Sullivan County Association and the resulting revision of boundaries to accommodate its member churches. The Grafton-Orange, Merrimack, and Cheshire Associations all absorbed some Sullivan County churches into their membership.

A delegation from this year's General Synod made it sound so wonderful that the rest of us felt left out for not having attended! They told us about experiences of feeling united despite

differences, such as participating in the rainbow scarf projects that raise awareness of bullying and hate, especially that directed toward the gay community.

After a wonderful lunch, the business meeting continued. Clergy were recognized for their number of years serving the state, the Conference Registrar delivered a report, and the election of Conference leadership was held.

We ratified the vote on new boundaries for the Grafton-Orange, Cheshire, and Merrimack Associations, then discussed and unanimously passed the new budget.

The meeting closed with a lovely worship service of bidding prayer, offering, Communion, and hymns.

Should anyone wish to review it, my conference folder is in the Parish Hall.

LEAVING... But Not Leaving

Most of you have likely heard that I am starting as the Interim Pastor of First Congregational Church of Croydon, United Church of Christ, on December 1. In the newsletter last month Steve explained a bit about the process that I am going through on my path to ordination, and this isn't directly part of that process. I guess you can call it an experience supplement to the ordination process—which may become part of the process after I have passed through my ecclesiastical council but in the meantime is running parallel to it.

This may bring up a question for you about what this means for my relationship with FCC Lebanon. There is a lot that we need to figure out yet, but I can answer part of it. As the interim pastor, I am not allowed to become a member of the Croydon congregation. This reflects the fact that I am there to provide an outside perspective, to help them tackle the challenging process of figuring out what part of their congregational identity left with the retirement of their pastor and what part resides with the congregation itself, and to help them decide "what's next." I am also not allowed to be considered for the position of their settled pastor, to maintain that outsider status when it comes to this process.

This means that Marty and I will remain members of FCC Lebanon as long as I am the pastor at the Croydon church. On my part this will largely be represented through my continuing financial pledge in support of FCC's ministry. In essence, it will be very similar to my time as an intern at the Lyme church. Beyond that Marty and I have a lot to figure out before we settle on a new routine as we fully enter the career and life change that this opportunity represents.

Thank you for the part you have played in my journey thus far and will continue to play going forward.
