## The Pastoral Perspective

No.

No. No. No.

That is what I thought when I saw the sweater in the children's department at Target. In a world awash with cynicism and snark, this attempt at seasonal whimsy seemed so wrong, so contrary to the message of joy and possibility that is at the heart of the Christmas story. It was, to be honest, kind of depressing. But it was also a reminder of the witness to which the church is called in today's world.



There are lots of reasons for people to grouse, to worry about the state of affairs, to wish things were different. Hunger, hate, war, and suffering are still with us, along with greed, violence, and cruelty. Our civic discourse is angry and coarse. If in the past we had an Age of Reason, our contemporary era seems on track to be remembered as the Age of Cynicism.

There is, though, a different way, a healthier, holier approach to living—one we are called to contemplate, anticipate, and prepare for during this Advent Season. Rather than be captive to the oh-so-knowing, snide zeitgeist, we can embrace our call as Children of Light, as followers of Jesus. We can rededicate ourselves to furthering the Gospel's message of hope, to living as disciples of the One who offered the perfect expression and embodiment of that hope through his birth, life, death, and resurrection.

To do so requires making a choice, even taking a stand. It doesn't mean being naïve or ignoring the challenges that face us as individuals and as a society. But by opting to be an Advent people, a community that eagerly awaits the arrival of Emmanuel, God With Us, we join with all

## COMMITTEE NOTES

#### **DIACONATE**

At their November meeting the Deacons discussed **new materials** to welcome members, opting to provide three separate documents: an updated pew brochure for visitors, a "Frequently Asked Questions" document to be put on the FCC website, and a welcome packet for new members. One FAQ, with a response, will be offered in each monthly newsletter.

Linda Jacobs recently stepped down from her leadership of the Called to Care program. The mission of this ministry, as described by Barb Teeter, has been to reach out to individuals who can no longer attend FCC but who wish to remain connected to the church. As active participation in the program has gradually declined, it was decided that the Deacons could assume the duties of this ministry and allow Called to Care to be retired. Steve Silver will keep a list of those desiring to benefit from this lay pastoral care. Further discussion will follow.

The Deacons also discussed their leadership of Sunday afternoon services at **Genesis** during the month of November. It's likely this program will be repeated in 2017. Responding to an issue raised in worship during Joys and Concerns, they also approved the purchase of several **personal** listening devices to aid hearing in the Sanctuary.

Susan Montmagny reported that there are currently about 1300

Open and Affirming (ONA)

churches in the UCC, which represents 27% of UCC churches overall. While the movement is strong and going forward, prayers are requested for continuing progress. As previously approved, a rainbow stripe for our sign on the front lawn will be ordered soon, to designate FCC as an ONA church. Steve Silver would also like to join

with the Dartmouth Campus Ministry in reaching out to the college's LGBTQ community, particularly graduate students who may live in the Lebanon area.

Biff Simpson reported on the need for a new DVD player, for **Movie Night** and other events. The Deacons have decided to offer a Movie Night every other month through June.

Worship, Giving, Service

Giving, prayer, and exuberance all inspired a moment of ecstatic worship. Each fall we are encouraged to consider the many gifts, large and small, that we receive from our amazingly generous God. This year, may we respond to that generosity, like David, in a spirit of joyful thanksgiving. Let us be inspired by David's example to pray, to serve, and to give with a sense of life-affirming, joyous possibility.

We come to know the joy of the Christian life through the love of God, a redemptive, neverending, life-sustaining, and freely given gift. This joy inspires us to be active stewards, returning to God and giving to God's people some of what he has so generously shared with us.

Offering envelopes for 2017 are available in the Parish Hall. Once you've submitted a pledge form, please take whichever box you wish and record your name and number on the list.

## Which Offering Is Which?

As any semi-regular visitor to Sunday worship knows, our stewardship effort asks us to consider a variety of offering collections throughout the year. It's helpful to recognize that each offering serves a distinct purpose:

**Regular offering**—Collected every Sunday, and treated as general, unrestricted support for FCC's operations, ministries, and programming. This includes all stewardship pledges and payments.

Communion offering—Collected every first Sunday of the month, directly supporting the Diaconate's Open-Door Ministry for community assistance (primarily gas and grocery cards) or occasionally designated for a specific mission need. Any contribution received in a communion envelope goes to this fund.

**Special UCC offerings** (e.g., One Great Hour of Sharing, Strengthen the Church, Neighbors in Need, Christmas Fund)—Each collected once annually, as part of a national or international campaign for a particular mission or service cause.

No matter which envelopes we use, THANKS TO ALL for so generously and consistently supporting this diversity of purposes, here at FCC and far beyond!




