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The Pastoral Perspective

Many years ago, when I worked for the Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts, I visited a congregation north of Boston to talk about stewardship. The conversation was wide-ranging and stimulating, and after a while headed in unanticipated directions, including ruminations about the Eucharist. We didn't discuss how it should be served—in Episcopal churches, the norm is to come forward to the altar to receive the elements. Instead, we discussed the matter of the elements themselves. Specifically, whether one might substitute things for bread and wine, like, oh, pizza and soda.

There is a fairly strong argument to be made, drawing on Scripture, that we should stick with bread and wine (or juice), as these are the things that Jesus served to his disciples. But another stance is possible, too. If the elements are meant to represent something (Jesus' body, Jesus' sacrifice for us), then might there be some flexibility around what is used to symbolize Jesus and his work? And is not the power of communion to be found in our sharing it with others? The first Christians, after all, celebrated the Eucharist while sharing a real meal. Maybe we could do that, too, over a large pepperoni pie and a diet Coke.

Fear not. We will not be experimenting with the elements at the table. We will not surprise you one month with exotic substitutes for familiar bread and juice. But I do hope that when the elements are brought to us, or we come forward to the table, we do so with open hearts and minds, with a faith-inspired curiosity that allows us to see anew the wonderful things that God has done and is doing and will do for us. By being open to the power of the Spirit, we can be as surprised as we would be if pizza and soda showed up one Sunday at the communion table.

May God spare us from experiencing communion as the "same old, same old" and instead bless us to come to the table with a sense of discovery, with the delight of encountering something beautiful and life-giving for the very first time. May we come to the table ready to experience something surprising, something amazing, something that will set our souls on fire.

Collection boxes are in the Parish Hall; donations accepted through February 12.



COMMITTEE NOTES

BOARD OF GOVERNORS

At its January meeting, the Board of Governors discussed committee membership and leaders for the coming year. All supported John Gilliatt for continuing as chair and Walter Scott as vice-chair and scribe. Steve Silver commended the group for its efficiency and achievements in 2016. The group clarified its working process going forward and shared updates on their three-year plan, focusing on the Parish Hall floor refinishing and Sanctuary carpet and pew cushions.

Surveying other projects in the Sanctuary, the board considered design and installation of a railing for the altar steps, long desired to assist those who have difficulty on them. As the Sanctuary painting project concludes, Steve Silver proposed that the two front pews be replaced with half-pews from the corner boxes. This would provide long-needed space for wheelchair accommodation, as well as more space for communion, musical performances, and other events. Wendell Smith inquired about the provision of additional lighting for concerts, which Steve will discuss with Henry Danaher.

Around the grounds, a fall cleanwas not arranged this year, and the Boy Scouts will be approached for help with a thorough spring cleanup. Wayne Braley is assessing the need for repairs on the decking in front of the Sanctuary portico.

Brandon Mason will coordinate an **energy audit** to be completed by an outside contractor in the last week

FCC ANNUAL MEETING 2017 Sunday, February 12, at 11:15 am

The Annual Meeting of First Congregational Church of Lebanon, NH, will be held in the Parish Hall on Sunday, February 12, 2017, immediately following the worship service, for the purpose of:

- **1.** The election of all officers provided for under the CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS of the church.
- 2. To hear the reports of all officers, committees, and organizations, as required under the CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS of the church.
 - **3.** To consider and act upon any other matters relating to the general church welfare that may properly come before this meeting, including but not limited to the following:
- A. Church Council, acting on a proposal from the Diaconate, recommends that the following be removed from the Diaconate's responsibilities, as listed in the church's Constitution and By-Laws (Feb. 2015 ed., p. 14): "They shall secure adequate childcare coverage during the worship services and other special events as required."

With this clause removed, responsibility for securing childcare will fall to the Personnel Subcommittee of Church Council, which already is charged with "assist[ing] and mak[ing] recommendations for action to the Council regarding employees and volunteer staff (p. 13)."

of January. As a non-profit, we are receiving a discount on the cost of this comprehensive, long-discussed assessment. The group also checked in on hot-water system maintenance in the bathrooms and kitchen, and about proper oven operation.

The two **AED units** purchased in December will be installed in mid-February. They will be located on the back wall of the Sanctuary and near the larger bathroom in the Parish Hall. A state safety official has volunteered to provide us a

training session on proper use once we've received the units.

Members of the board worked on sundry projects around the church after their meeting. The congregation is grateful for their vital service and devotion to the care of our building!

CHURCH COUNCIL

In January at Council, Barb Jones reported that the **Diaconate** was discussing future directions for lay pastoral care and investigating what comparable programs other churches have. The group is also planning for Steve Silver's sabbatical this summer. Susan Montmagny has, unfortunately, had to step down from her Diaconate service.

Another critical issue the Deacons are facing is the need to find new childcare assistants, as Emma Petersson has indicated that she can't continue. Some suggestions were made for replacing Emma, including inquiring with local educational and early-childhood programs. All agreed that parents and Ashley Oronte (the other assistant) should both have input. and any candidates will be carefully screened. It was also agreed that no member of the congregation should be asked to do this (and thus be obligated to give up worship), unless someone actively seeks this role.

This development has prompted broader questions about whether the Diaconate should continue to have **responsibility for childcare staffing,** on top of its many other duties. (The Diaconate originally was given this task because of its Stewardship 2017

relation to worship.) The Deacons asked the Council to re-assign this responsibility, either to the Personnel Subcommittee or Council itself. It was pointed out that because this duty is assigned in the church bylaws, any revision would require a congregational vote, which could be taken at Annual Meeting.

John Gillatt reported for the Board of Governors that the AED units purchased last fall would arrive in February. The Sanctuary paint color survey was completed by 43 people, of whom 19 chose light grev, against 15 for blue and 9 for either. Steve Silver has also talked to Don Collins to ensure that his crew will include the organ case and the doors at the front of the Sanctuary (on either side of the proscenium arch); Council members agreed that we should be able to have at least the doors included for no additional cost.

Another question arose regarding the status of our **fire inspections**, **alarms, and insurance** coverage, in the wake of the tragic fire at First Baptist Church on December 28. All of these vital safety precautions are in good order and up-to-date. It was also noted that our entrances are all sufficiently secure, although the office door sometimes does not fully shut and latch on its own. (The Board of Governors will be addressing that.)

For Stewardship, Jon Scott strongly encouraged all members of Council and other committees to submit pledge forms, regardless of financial amount. Even the smallest pledge still carries weight as a commitment to the church's ministries in the coming year. Pledge reminders will be forthcoming by email and other church communications.

Brian Clancy reported for the Music Committee that the winter schedule includes more concerts than usual. He also shared exciting news that the Upper Valley Music Center is exploring the purchase of 8 South Park Street, the property immediately east of church. Not only would this be a huge upgrade for UVMC itself, it would enhance

the already strong relationship we have with them.

Amy Driscoll admitted that the **Nominating** process is somewhat behind this year, but she has been discussing key vacancies with Steve Silver, Barb Jones, and others. She continues to hope that we can increase congregational awareness of our different committees and, particularly, financial operations.

Steve Silver reported on the draft budget for 2017, which is largely complete. Discussion ensued on various specific items, such as the budgeted capacity for projects such as refinishing the Parish Hall floor and new pew cushions and carpet in the Sanctuary. While the budget does account for planned expenses as far as possible, additional projects are typically still possible during the year. Council approved the budget, pending revisions as noted, for a vote at the Annual Meeting.

Steve Silver submitted his pastoral report electronically, but he made particular mention of the inspiring congregational participation in Christmas events and ministries. He expressed how gratifying and spiritually rich it was to see so many join together at a busy time. Steve also noted the Diaconate's plans for a consistent, regular preacher and pastor during his sabbatical.

Lastly, he reported on a discussion he had shared with the Diaconate about his decision to leave the national and denominational flags out of the Sanctuary after the painting is completed. All present supported the rationale that the placement of potent symbols such as flags in a place of worship poses a theological conflict. Steve said he plans to preach on this issue on January 22.

DIACONATE

In January the Deacons discussed the "Umbrella of Caring" envisioned for our lay pastoral care ministry. It was decided to emphasize prayer while considering other ways to encourage the congregation's participation in a variety of caring activities. Steve Silver offered to provide training on prayer which could lead to visitation training. Diaconate members will investigate resources for developing this ministry, and further discussion will take place in February.

The Deacons also approved more funding for gas and grocery cards for the **Open Door Ministry**. It was agreed that this ministry should be featured in the FCC newsletter. Services at Genesis are planned again for November, and Deacons were asked to consider an additional month or two (maybe March or July).

Emma Petersson wishes to finish her childcare work at FCC, and the issue of hiring a replacement will be taken to Council. In discussion, it was noted that this responsibility would be more appropriate for the Personnel Committee.

Steve Silver opened a discussion about his desire to remove the **flags from the Sanctuary** to the Parish Hall on a permanent basis. It was generally agreed that it is appropriate for the Cross to be the sole symbol in the Sanctuary, and that the

presence of state symbols may well pose a theological complication.

Biff Simpson presented a tentative schedule for **Movie Nights** from February through June. There is need to discuss the purpose of this event, to determine the appropriate time and selection of films as well as the future of this program. Two deacons are needed to volunteer to coordinate set-up of screen and chairs and arranging the Sunday worship configuration afterwards.

Susan Montmagny has stepped down from her position on the Diaconate—her service has been greatly appreciated. Deb Scott will be rotating off as of the Annual Meeting. Steve Silver plans to ask several congregation members to consider serving.



OUR LOCAL MISSION

"Come In..." FCC's Open-Door Ministry and Community Assistance



Upper-Valley residents routinely call or visit the church office to ask for help with gas, food, and other basic living expenses. FCC has responded to these needs for years, but demand for assistance has increased considerably in the recent past. Supported by our monthly communion offering, the Diaconate funds the purchase of \$25 gift cards from JAKE'S and PRICE CHOPPER, while the Mission and Social Action Committee (funded by the Dole Trust) provides additional assistance in modest amounts for rent and utilities. Recipients need offer nothing other than their names (and, as applicable, that of their landlord or utility company), and they are asked only to wait 4-6 months between requests to ensure a fairer distribution of resources.

Long known as the "Back-Door" Ministry for our office's location at the rear of the building, this vital community program in 2015 was renamed the **Open-Door Ministry**, removing any hint of secrecy or shame from this assistance in favor of a more inclusive, welcoming spirit. Our neighbors are genuinely grateful for this support.
