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# The Pastoral Perspective

The Pew Research Center reported last December that "Partisanship continues to be *the* dividing line in the American public's political attitudes, far surpassing differences by age, race and ethnicity, gender, educational attainment, religious affiliation, or other factors." To anybody who has been paying even the slightest attention to the world around us, this is not surprising news. It is, however, sad and disturbing. Rather than being a civic forum where citizens can find solutions to difficult problems, politics has now become a source of intense division. What should be a way for us to build a common wealth together has instead become a way for us to separate ourselves into warring camps.

As Christians, we need to face this reality with honesty, courage, and humility. We supposedly give our allegiance, our loyalty, to the God we know in and through Jesus Christ. We look for answers to life's great questions in Scripture. This all sounds obvious, but we know the truth is more complicated. All too often, church-going people seem to take their cue from political convictions. This is the case for people on both the right and the left. The practice of Christian faith all too often is the pursuit of a political platform.

None of this is new; the problem has existed for a long time. But in this election year, it is especially important that we recognize what is going on—and not just with others but ourselves. One of my mentors once pithily said, "Church and state are not the same as faith and politics." We should bring our morals into the voting booth, even as we seek to keep the church out of government—and the government out of the church.

One of the great things about our country is that religion has always flourished without the involvement of the state. In America, it has been the responsibility of dedicated people to make their individual

# COMMITTEE NOTES

#### **BOARD OF GOVERNORS**

At its January meeting the Board of Governors followed up on the **Parsonage** energy audit with plans for obtaining estimates for the work recommended. Two companies will conduct walk-through consultations in order to draft proposals. The group is also researching contractors to repair the Parsonage sewer line.

Plans for kitchen-vent and Sanctuary insulation are also ongoing, to be coordinated with Wayne Braley. The Braley family has been preoccupied with the passing of Laurie's brother Ed Leavitt, but Wayne was able to complete the installation of a railing on the chancel steps in late January. Wayne's work has been excellent for many years, but it may be useful to have other options for times when Wayne is too busy with his regular workload.

Reviewing **snow-removal** duties, the group commended Chip Silver's improving efforts but recognized the limits of his age, experience, and schedule. Terry Ellison has

offered generous assistance, but we may also have to accept a degree of imperfection in this area.

Wendell Smith has continued to work with the **Scouts** to evaluate their storage needs, which pose some challenges relative to the clearance of the dirt cellar under the Sanctuary. It was suggested that a Scout representative could attend a future Board meeting.

All current members of the Board of Governors will continue serving in the new year. John Gilliatt was nominated to remain chair, and Walter Scott will continue as vice chair and secretary.

#### CHURCH COUNCIL

Nan Parsons reported to Council that Sunday-morning programs in the **Children's Community Corner** are going well. Responding to a question about coffee-hour snacks for children, she confirmed that the kids have snacks downstairs during the service.

Brian Clancy reported that the Music Committee had not yet met as a group to discuss next steps in the search for a successor to Henry Danaher, although he has spoken individually with some committee members. There are no urgent leads to follow as yet, and Susan Sorensen is a reliable interim option who is available to stay for an extended period while a search is conducted. The new search committee will be formed in February.

The Rev. Steve Silver reported on the work of our campaign planning group: Kathy Beckett, Amy Driscoll, Corrine Erskine, Barb Jones, Barb Laro, Sue Pratt, Jon Scott, and Wendell Smith. They've discussed three main purposes—Community Care (renovation of the kitchen and other facilities for congregational service), Creation Care (resource (conservation and environmental stewardship), and Mission (a pledge to direct 10% of the campaign total toward local and global outreach). A central issue is our willingness to

present these purposes effectively and persuade both members of the congregation and others in the wider community to contribute to them. The campaign will be brought to the full congregation at Annual Meeting and extend for a threemonth period; pledges made in that time can be fulfilled over 3-5 years.

In advance of **Annual Meeting** on February 9, Steve noted that report preparation and budget planning were largely complete. The primary challenge in our volunteer roster is the need for a new Treasurer, as Terry Ellison is stepping down from that post. (Terry will continue until a successor is found.)

Amid Steve's regular duties within and beyond the congregation, he and the Diaconate are considering our role in the **NH Conference** and the national UCC. Conference Minister Gordon Rankin, who has subsequently discussed this issue with Steve, will visit FCC as a guest preacher on March 22.

Stewardship chair Jon Scott noted a successful pledge process for 2020. We have received 32 commitments thus far for the year, more than in recent years. Jon highlighted one particularly generous gift supporting our music ministry, directed in part toward FCC's efforts to provide music for the wider community.

#### DIACONATE

In January the Diaconate planned to revisit the **membership** review following Annual Meeting. The

group also confirmed that three deacons eligible for reelection will be continuing, while Linda Gerlach and Dawn Troutman have agreed to join the Diaconate. Barb Teeter will succeed Barb Jones as Senior Deacon, as the latter finishes her second full term. Alyson Danyew-Ellison will continue as Diaconate Treasurer, and Bob Gerlach will remain Secretary.

In his pastor's report, the Rev. Steve Silver noted that the spring meeting of the Grafton-Orange-Sullivan Association will be held March 8 in East Corinth, VT. The meeting will include an ecclesiastical council for Eliot Fay, so FCC representation is important. Steve also gave updates on the campaign planning process and interim music plans.






