The Pastoral Perspective

With the arrival of a New Year, the time to make some resolutions has arrived. And since this is a church publication, I invite you to consider taking up a commitment or two relating to the life of faith. Perhaps you'll pray more. Or maybe read your Bible more regularly. You might feel called to participate in a service ministry like the Community Dinner, or to engage in pastoral care work through Called to Care. Whatever it is, this is the time to make your resolution.

But some might protest that resolutions are hard to keep. By the time this newsletter has gone to press in the first week of the month, millions of people around the world will have already broken their New Year's resolutions-evidence, some might suggest, that resolutions aren't worth the effort. If they can't be kept for even a week or two, why bother?

The fallacy in this way of thinking, of course, is that fault is assigned to the resolutions and not to the one keeping them. The planned commitment to lose weight, exercise more, be kinder to others-or to pray intentionally, study Scripture, or serve one's neighbor-is commendable, regardless of whether the one who sets out do so succeeds or fails. The onus isn't on the resolution; it's on those making resolutions: you and me.

Fortunately, we're not alone as we consider our faith resolutions for the coming year. We've got the church to support us, people who will pray and learn and help out alongside us. Even more powerfully, we've got God, who will walk with us, encourage us, and hold us as we try to live the Christian life more fully.

Jesus never promised us that following his way would be easy. On the contrary, his invitation to be disciples is filled with challenges. The life of faith takes work and effort and dedication. That's where resolutions can actually help. The commitment we make

COMMITTEE NOTES

CHURCH COUNCIL

At its December meeting Council heard from Todd Heatherton, who has been working (with his wife Trish) to review the church's books and accounts status. Todd explained and proposed several issues for discussion and asked for feedback. Council voted unanimously to authorize the payment of a \$10,000 pledge for 2013 to the NH Conference of the UCC. The treasury required additional cash for remaining 2013 expenses, for which Council unanimously approved a transfer of funds by the Trustees.

Trish Heatherton reported for the Board of Governors that our insurance carrier has asked us to finish painting the east side of the church exterior. Don Collins has submitted a proposal of \$17,500, for which Council voted to use the Waldo trust allocation for 2014. We will arrange to have Don complete the project in the spring. Trish also noted that Chimney Savers has installed stainless-steel liners in both the church's chimneys. They are now protected and should function effectively for years, with regular maintenance.

Amy Driscoll reported that the Nominating Committee has made progress toward filling available committee and leadership positions. She expects to have most, if not all, current vacancies filled in advance of the annual meeting.

Brian Clancy reported that the Music at the Meetinghouse fall series ended successfully, with several well attended concerts, great music, and good feedback. He added that the **Music Committee** has collected almost 40 music ministry surveys, which will be particularly useful now, with the imminent departure of Will Ögmundson in February.

There will be a reception during coffee hour sometime in January to thank Will and wish him well. The committee is looking for an interim musician for Sunday mornings, and the search for a new permanent music director will begin early in January.

For the **Stewardship Committee**, Jon Scott reports that the church has received just over 30 pledges for 2014, totaling approximately \$40,000. We continue to accept pledges into the new year.

On January 12 there will be an "international" forum and potluck lunch after church, to raise awareness and interest in a mission trip to El Salvador.

Steve Silver reminded Council of the variety of services and events leading up to Christmas—the Blue Christmas Service, the NH homeless memorial vigil, and three services on Christmas Eve. He also reported that Robert Grabill, from the UCC Church at Dartmouth, is eager to preach as our guest on December 29.

DIACONATE

At their December meeting the Deacons considered our response to neighbors in need during this hard time of year. The church's Back-Door Ministry, supported with funds from the monthly Communion Offering, enables the church to distribute gas cards and food vouchers to a number of community members. People in need of shelter or fuel assistance have also been aided by these funds in the past, when emergencies arise.

The Deacons also provided yearend support to the two local agencies with whom we partner, WISE and Second Growth. As many are aware, WISE "provides advocacy, crisis services, and community education to those affected by domestic and sexual violence and stalking throughout the Upper Valley," while Second Growth's mission is "to create, deliver, and evaluate innovative programs that reduce the risk for adolescent substance abuse and violence, and to train others to replicate those programs."

There are also opportunities to serve within our church. The Prayer Team was for many years led by Betty Tedeschi, who has
