The Pastoral Perspective

The Magi, according to the Gospel of Matthew, traveled from the East and were guided by a star to the infant Jesus. We know little about these visitors: their ages, nationality, even their number all remain a mystery to us. That hasn't stopped people from trying to fill in the blanks. Tradition tells us that the Magi were kings, of whom there were three, by the names of Balthazar, Melchior, and Gaspar.

But what is "tradition?" In the Church, it's "the process of handing on Christian faith and practice," or so says the Oxford Companion to Christian Thought at the beginning of an entry that takes up about one and one half large pages in miniscule type. We might think of tradition as the accumulated beliefs and actions that shape the way we do and tell things. Some streams of Christianity invest tradition with more importance and standing than others. Some traditions are putatively shared by all members of a denomination, others by a single church. The bottom line, though, is that tradition is part of what we do and who we are.

One of the upshots of this is that we need to be mindful of why we follow traditions and why they have so much power for us. Tradition can be a wonderful thing, reinforcing our faith and helping us better understand things that are hard to comprehend. But tradition can also be a crutch, used to continue what has always been done, simply because that is the way things have been. It can buttress the power of insiders, those who were here first and lay claim to a special knowledge. Length of practice and commitment are not in question here; slavish deference and unwarranted devotion are. The truth is that then we stop seeing with fresh eyes, we are in danger of being blind to what is going on around us.

Personally, I like tradition. It is grounding and comforting. It allows me to be in communion with other Christians, both those who are alive today and those who have come before. Tradition gives me a sense of being part of something larger than myself. But I am aware that it can be all too easy to do things a certain way simply because "that's the way it's always been" or "that's how we've always done it." If we adhere to tradition, we must ever be conscious of why we do so.

COMMITTEE NOTES

DIACONATE

At their December meeting, the Deacons discussed FCC's role in the Community Nursing Project, for which Barb Teeter and Alyson Danyew-Ellison attended a recent planning meeting. Our church is a program sponsor, and Barb and Alyson serve as board members; there is no financial obligation. The question is how we identify those who need the program's help, and what Barb and Alyson's responsibilities will be.

In our Ministry of Caring, several older members of the congregation were suggested to receive Christmas cards from the children in Church School, and a few more potential recipients for prayer shawls were identified. Deacons agree on the need for a more structured approach for prayer requests, and we would like to establish a website link to receive and follow prayer requests. The challenge would be how to access the site in a mobile format.

Revisiting the Sunday afternoon services at Genesis, it was noted that a dedicated group of Deacons made these successful. Having met with the recreational director, Kathy Beckett confirmed that a simpler service format is best, although

the time of the services cannot be changed. Genesis has its own large-print songbooks, but residents need assistance finding pages and seeing text clearly. As for how often FCC can offer to run the services, it was agreed that two months would be feasible, preferably May and November.

In his pastor's report, Steve Silver clarified plans for services during Advent and Christmas Eve; the Teeters offered to serve communion at the 11:00 candlelight service. He also noted the December 17 prayer forum and plans for a prayer email box. And in addition to his usual participation in wider-church activities, Steve will be joining the Life-care Board at APD.

Barb Jones and Steve also attended a training session for how to handle an active shooter in church. While this remains quite unlikely, we must accept that it could happen and be as prepared as possible. We need to balance security and hospitality; one question, for example, regards whether and when to lock our doors on Sunday mornings. Steve will be reporting more fully on this issue when Council next meets.

The Deacons will meet next on January 8 at the Woodlands.


