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# The Pastoral Perspective

While I was off in July, I had the opportunity to reflect on going to church, on the presence of things and people I can count on, and, yes, to begin thinking about the fall and year to come. Ultimately, all three of these things were related.

Over these past weeks, I had the chance to attend a worship service in Maine over the Fourth of July weekend, at a chapel where I've worshiped in the past. The other weeks, I attended different churches online. Each service was good, and watching worship online, I once again felt immense gratitude to all who have borne with us during the pandemic and done church virtually. While livestreamed worship is exceedingly convenient, it's not the same as being in church, in person. Personally, I like seeing people, hearing their voices, immersing myself in the sights and sounds of a full sanctuary. And so, I extend my thanks to each of you. Thank you for coming to church, whether in-person or virtually.

I could hear the pealing of our church bell before Sunday worship. That sound not only calls us to worship in the present but also connects us to the past and, yes, hopefully leads us into the future.

I cannot say what the future holds, what issues will command our attention, which crises might disrupt our lives. Of course, that does not mean I will submit to a resignation to whatever befalls us. We will still make plans, dream dreams, and think about how we might use the time that is allotted to us.

This coming fall, I'll be spending a bit of time looking at issues of racial justice, specifically our relationship with what is known as the Black church. This is something I started doing in earnest in the spring, and I will focus more on the topic during my study leave in August, as I finish the book *Reading While Black* by Esau McCaulley. I'll take a deep dive into an online course taught by Prof. McCaulley and N. T. Wright on "Ethnicity, Justice, and the People of God." McCaulley is Black, Wright is White, and their explorations of Scripture and the faith in this context will be fascinating and illuminating. McCaulley is American, Wright is English. Yet rather than focus on what differentiates them, I will note that both are priests in the Anglican tradition, both are articulate and engaging teachers, and

## Greeters and Liturgists Needed!



## NEWS AND NOTES

#### CHURCH COUNCIL

Jon Scott opened Council in June by asking each member to reflect on what currently brings us joy, hope, and gratitude. People mentioned relationships with family and friends, spring weather and gardens (at FCC and elsewhere), and cautious hope on political issues. Several recognized the joy of Children's Sunday, with festive attendance, leadership and service by the kids, outdoor fellowship, and the baptism of Mac and Jack Callahan at Storrs Hill.

The NH Conference's consultants. Revs. Gordon Rankin and Campbell Lovett, had circulated a revised proposal and recommendations regarding next steps. Appreciating their observations, Jon emphasized that changing dynamics over many years, both inside and outside FCC's congregation, should be recognized with more intentionality. Valerie Nevel stressed the need to preserve institutional memory in some way, as some practices or agreements aren't explicitly recorded in our bylaws. Barb Jones expressed her concern about our ability to find time for further discussions, given how we already feel overtaxed as a congregation. Jon urged us to put in the necessary work if possible.

There was general support for a **second listening session** to include more voices, particularly from the Diaconate; ultimately, all agreed that the session should be open to the congregation. Jon explained that it would be open-ended, rather than framed with a particular topic or agenda. The NHC team offers a neutral forum for a wide-ranging

discussion among our congregation. Jon, Barb, and Rev. Steve Silver will be present, but the priority is to hear new voices and thoughts. Valerie cautioned that raising new issues which we can't solve or act on could perhaps be worse than not hearing the issues at all. John Gilliatt added that Council needs to be responsible for providing feedback, at least so that people know they've been heard. Initially set for June 23, the session has been rescheduled to **Monday, August 15, at 6:00 pm**.

In his pastor's report, Rev. Silver expressed appreciation for the June event for Ukraine at the La Salette shrine in Enfield. The service drew an impressive group of speakers, such as an inspiring representative from Samaritan's Purse who has worked with refugees throughout eastern Europe. Steve also credited Dominic Watson with the impetus for the Children's Community Corner's Upstanders for Ukraine fundraiser. As he concludes service as treasurer for the Congregational Library, Steve also affirmed the work that Valerie Nevel and Dawn Troutman do to manage FCC's finances.

Barb Jones reported that Sue Pratt would serve as the at-large member of **Pastor-Parish Relations**. Barb also lifted up the news that Stacey Steele had officially become a US citizen on June 9.

Responding to a discussion in the Diaconate, Council considered ventilation in the downstairs space, a concern as we consider returning to **in-person children's programs** in the fall. The group feels we should invest in that space to ensure that recent momentum (as evidenced on Children's Sunday) would continue. Nan Parsons clarified, however, that the program's traditional emphasis on in-person gatherings may have shifted toward a hybrid model. Zoom is hardly ideal on its own, but it has surely made it easier for many kids and families to participate, including some who never have before.

Dawn Troutman offered an idea about **engaging the community more directly at non-FCC events**. In addition to flyers and testimonials from current members about why they are a part of our congregation, all agreed that it would be ideal to extend some in-person invitation at concerts and other events to explore FCC's worship life.

Council continues to check in regarding the status of our COVID protocols, especially as young kids are now eligible for vaccination. Without formally voting, the group generally agreed to maintain current practices through the summer. In a subsequent email discussion in July, Council and the Diaconate considered the news that a person who attended worship on July 17 tested positive for COVID within 12 hours. (Following all recommendations for

isolating and notifying close contacts, the person soon recovered.) The email discussion considered whether to suspend in-person worship for some period of time, but ultimately all agreed that was unnecessary as long as the remote option remains available to anyone at any time.

#### DIACONATE

The Deacons continue to follow up on **congregational-care needs**, such as Ernie Drown's recovery from hand surgery and Dawn Troutman's progress recovering from a broken ankle. Numerous prayer shawls have been presented over the years, and the group discussed the need for more volunteer knitters, with Sue Pratt offering to train them.

The Rev. Steve Silver was pleased with the energy of the **Children's Sunday** worship service, led by the kids in various ways. He also affirmed the Callahan baptism by the creek at Storrs Hill, which sets a precedent for an outdoor rite if desirable again. The Deacons observed that our current cluster of kids around age 10 should have some ongoing attention as a group, perhaps in the form of Deacon or confirmation mentors. The group also discussed the need to improve ventilation downstairs in order to resume activities there. Steve will speak with both Council and Nan Parsons regarding summer and fall plans, including the option of hybrid programming this fall.

The Deacons expressed interest in holding **outdoor worship** services in August or September. They also have supported the resumption of post-worship coffee hour while the weather still permits that to happen outside. In our reduced communion format during the pandemic, Steve has tended to manage setting up the elements himself, although the Deacons' continued assistance with this responsibility is appreciated.

For Eliot Fay's ordination service on June 26, the Deacons planned a reception to celebrate this important milestone, as FCC has helped Eliot throughout this process. The Scott family will hold a family baptism in Plainfield for Walter and Deserai's children in September. Carolin Bassett's memorial service will take place on Saturday, September 24, close to her and Bob's wedding anniversary. We will also hold a memorial for Larry Doyle this fall in conjunction with an opportunity for congregational hospitality, with which many associate him.

Rev. Silver took vacation in July, with the Rev. Gail Dimick leading worship in his absence; he will also take a week of study leave in mid-August, so Chris Chase will preach on August 14. This fall Steve plans to lead a Wednesday-evening book group, discussing Esau McCaulley's *Reading While Black.* The author and his book will be included in an N. T. Wright online course on race and Christianity, which Steve will take during his study leave.

both are called to share the Word of God in the pulpit, in the classroom, and through the media. These two men get that an essential part of being a Christian is being in community.

Of course, we know this. We look at the Trinity, the three persons of God, who are one. We look at the pattern of Jesus' life, lived in community with the disciples. We think of the Holy Spirit, in each of us and extant throughout the world, binding together different people and faraway places.

So, think about what the future holds, and what you hope to see happen. Think about not just what you want, but what you can do for others. I ask this knowing that you, the people of FCC Lebanon, are a generous, giving group, one I can count on to do the right thing, to gather in the presence of God, to be his people, gathered in faith and hope and love.

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# THE ORDINATION OF ELIOT FAY


#### To the good folks of FCC,

# All are invited to join this "listening session," the second facilitated for FCC-Lebanon by the Revs. Gordon Rankin and Campbell Lovett from the NH Conference of the UCC.

These sessions are part of a process Church Council voted to pursue following this year's Annual Meeting, mainly prompted by some internal conflicts that had arisen over the past year. We asked for assistance from the NHC because we felt the concerns that had surfaced were beyond our capacity to manage on our own. The first session in April involved members of Council and our Pastor-Parish Relations Committee; this second session is meant to invite additional perspectives and voices. The NHC team will then develop a set of recommendations based on what they have heard in this process.

The range of possible topics is wide open. Our church is undergoing many different kinds of change and transition. Our volunteers and lay leaders feel stretched. Our church governance and communication structures and systems may not be as well suited to where we are today as they once were. Layered on top of this have been the challenges and stress of the pandemic, our long stretch without in-person worship and fellowship, the new world of remote worship, and more. How are you feeling about our worship and congregational life today? What are you looking forward to for the future? What is making you hopeful, making you anxious, or bringing you joy? Is there something church-related that's been bugging you, and you'd like to bring it to leadership's attention? Are there things you'd like to see done differently? Do you have suggestions for our pastor and staff, our deacons, or other church leaders?

Please know that we will do everything possible to make this Zoom session a safe and welcoming space for all concerned. Even if you think you have nothing in particular to share, you are still encouraged to attend. You may find that others' comments prompt you to contribute thoughts or suggestions that can help grow and strengthen our faith community, our worship experience, or our ministries and programs.

If you'd like to participate, please email Council Chair Jon Scott (jscottnh@comcast.net) or contact the church office, so that we can send you the Zoom link and a short "covenanting" document we will use to help guide our discussion. Rev. Rankin will provide additional background to open the session.

I look forward to seeing you on August 15 and hearing what you have to say.
