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
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The Pastoral Perspective

During Lent it has long been customary for people to give up something—in my case, coffee. I adopted this discipline a number of years ago when I decided I wanted to do something that would offer me the chance to reflect on Lent on a regular basis. Given the number of cups of coffee I drink daily, I enjoy many opportunities to do just this all throughout the weeks between Ash Wednesday and Easter. True, there are those instances when my abstention from java consumption elicits mild peevishness on my part rather than spiritual reflection. For the most part, though, I find this long-standing discipline an effective way to enter deeper into the Lenten season—to better have Jesus, as in the hymn "Lord, Who Throughout These Forty Days" (*Pilgrim Hymnal* #153), "Teach us with thee to mourn our sins, and close by thee to stay." This, though, prompts a question: shouldn't we be doing this all the time, throughout the year?

The short answer is, "Yes, but."

The "yes" is, of course, that we should always seek to turn from sin, from those actions and inactions that separate us from God and one another; that we should always recognize that we can't do this alone; that we need the strength and comfort of God if we are to have any hope of succeeding.

The "but," that dreaded but expected qualifier, is acknowledgment of our need for focus, both as we do challenging things and as we try to reflect upon what God is doing in Jesus. By having a special season of Lent, we can set aside time to begin the work of repentance and renewal, often hard work that will not be over for us when we sing that first Easter hymn; these forty days and forty nights are a time to start something, not contain it. We can use these coming weeks to begin to clear the spiritual decks for the gift of the Resurrection, which is both a moment in time that we

Why Aren't We Worshiping in the Sanctuary Anymore?

Some may wonder why we've held worship in the Parish Hall for the past few Sundays. Well, the choice isn't liturgical or aesthetic. It's not even to make sure we all look at each other.

It's simply a matter of conserving our resources.

As the Finance Committee reviewed our 2013 expenses, we noticed a significant increase in oil consumption—independent of the ever-rising price per gallon, which of course is beyond our control. While much of our building must be kept heated to a minimum level through the winter, heating our Sanctuary uses far more oil than any other space, and it requires no heat when not in use. (It's estimated that heating the Sanctuary for any single event can cost as much as \$300-400.)

The Board of Governors, with the support of Diaconate and Council leadership, determined that we could easily save both oil and money by leaving the Sanctuary dormant for a while.

"Where Are You?"-A Lenten Sermon Series

On Good Friday we recall the poignant, disturbing plea of Jesus from the cross, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" Yet as we do this, we hold fast to the belief that God is steadfast and true. Over four weeks we will consider and explore the stories of four of our biblical forebears and what they have to tell us as we contemplate one of the most challenging parts of the life of faith: those times when God seems absent.

March 23—Jonah: Resentment (*Jonah 3:10-4:3*)
March 30—Job: Suffering (*Job 31:35-40*)
April 6—Mary: Loss (*John 19:25b-30*)

COMMITTEE NOTES

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The members of the Christian Education Committee would like the congregation to mark several important dates for the spring:

On March 9, the children will be distributing colorfully decorated lunch bags for their annual Lenten fund-raiser. Proceeds collected during Lent will again benefit students in El Salvador and, closer to home, provide supplies for David's House. The bags will be collected on Palm Sunday, April 13.

On April 27, the committee, children, and other volunteers will prepare and serve our monthly Community Dinner.

Our annual Children's Day this year is June 8. Children will once again lead worship that morning, and there will be refreshments and an exhibit in the Parish Hall showing all that the children have learned during the year in church school. Kids will wear costumes and share projects exploring the theme of "Life in Biblical Times." Please plan to have your children participate in some way—and prepare to celebrate!

CHURCH COUNCIL

The February meeting of Church Council was canceled because of inclement weather. Council will next meet on March 18.

MISSION & SOCIAL ACTION AND STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEES

Our committees met jointly after worship on February 16. We agreed to continue holding joint meetings during 2014. Jon Scott and Corrine Erskine were elected to chair Stewardship and Mission & Social Action, respectively.

At the request of the Diaconate and the Mission & Social Action Committee, Steve Silver has been investigating cold-weather shelter needs in the Upper Valley and how our church might help. Steve Teeter has also looked into this issue. We learned that the Haven has recently expanded its capacity for providing overnight shelter during the winter, and that their facility in White River Junction has yet to run out of space this year. All agreed it would be helpful to learn more about homelessness and shelter needs in the Upper Valley and roles our congregation might play in making sure those needs are met. Members also expressed interest in deepening our relationship with the Haven.

Ron Bailey reported on the status of gun safety legislation in Concord, explaining that lawmakers failed to complete work on proposed background-check requirements that could have closed the "gun-show loophole." Until state law is changed, gun purchases made at

these shows do not require the standard background checks that happen for store purchases from federally-licensed dealers. Ron and the committee have updated the congregation with periodic emails and will continue to let us know when and how our involvement could be important.

As part of its mission the Stewardship committee will continue to focus on reducing the church's environmental footprint, starting with ways we might use energy more efficiently while also saving money. The committee strongly supports the move to worship in the Parish Hall more often during the winter, a choice which allows us significant savings immediately. The committee will coordinate its work closely with the Board of Governors and Church Council and expects to develop a series of low-cost, low-effort savings options in the coming weeks.

The committees will meet on the 2nd Sunday of each month after worship, except in March, when we will meet on the 16th.

COMMITTEE NOTES

Diaconate Prepares for Coming Year With New Membership

At its February meeting the Diaconate elected the following officers for the coming year—Jennifer Grant, chair; John Gillatt, vice-chair; Barb Teeter, clerk; and Ginger Smith, treasurer. Jennifer Grant and Barb Jones will represent the Diaconate on the Pastoral Relations Committee. The group also determined that Deb Scott and Barb Jones will lead the coordination of communion servers and supplies.

Resuming discussions initiated prior to the Annual Meeting, the deacons also considered a proposed amendment to Article V, Section 2 of the church by-laws that would mitigate the need to elect equal numbers of women and men to the Diaconate each year. The nominating process has suggested that it isn't always possible to identify enough candidates of each gender who are willing and able to serve in a given year. (Similarly, the amendment would alter the requirement to elect two youth deacons every year, since there often aren't enough younger candidates among the church's membership.) Indeed, as was evident at the Annual Meeting, the required balance between men and women could prevent an interested, capable church member from joining the Diaconate even when there are vacancies, simply because of that member's gender.

The current deacons (along with a couple of former deacons attending the meeting) generally agreed that the amendment makes sense, and in the course of discussion arrived at a commonly acceptable revision of the language that was proposed at the Annual Meeting. The revised amendment—which now goes to Church Council and ultimately a special business meeting for approval—recommends simply that gender balance be sought without actually requiring it:

Proposed Amendment to Artcle V, Section 2, of FCC By-Laws: "The Diaconate shall consist of twelve deacons, all covenant members and, when possible, equally balanced between men and women. Four deacons shall be elected at each annual meeting for a term of three years. The Diaconate may also include as many as two youth deacons, preferably covenant members, who shall be elected at the annual meeting for a term of one year."

Community Dinner Fund Available

The Mission & Social Action Committee and the Treasurer remind the congregation that a fund has been established to subsidize Community Dinner preparation. The fund was meant to encourage the provision of more nutritional and (when possible) locally-sourced food for these monthly dinners.

To request reimbursement from the Community Dinner Fund, Team Leaders should submit receipts, along with an explanatory note, to Treasurer Todd Heatherton.

ne Mind for Religious People with Prof. G. Christian Jernstedt

Church of Christ at Dartmouth College, Hanover

All are invited to join Chris Jernstedt, Professor Emeritus of Psychological and Brain Studies at Dartmouth, for an exploration of what science offers us to help think about who we are. Prof. Jernstedt's research has integrated recent insights into the human brain with the practical implications of our everyday learning. This five-week course will examine the connections between our religious beliefs and our knowledge of brain function, as well as the ways in which our core beliefs are represented in the brain.

Over the five weeks, we will ask some of the big questions about who we are.

I. What is the relationship between reality and our stories about it?

II. What is our place in the universe?

III. How is our brain built?

IV. How do we learn?

V. How can we support our actions and the actions of others?

VI. The life cycle: How do we develop, grow, mature, and age?

VII. Can we ever know what is going on inside ourselves and others?
