The Pastoral Perspective

Way back in 1986 Cornell University launched “Dear Uncle Ezra,” a service aimed at providing answers to just about any question anybody had. In time, Ezra migrated to the web, and on April 3, 2007, among queries about the dearth of investment banking opportunities for job seekers, confusion over who might take an introductory astronomy course, and a plea from administrative support staff for guidance on how to deal with negligent supervisors, was this question: “What is the origin of the modern custom of handshaking?”

Uncle Ezra offered this reply from cyberspace:

Dear Handshaker,

There are many conflicting theories about the origin of the handshake. It seems that the most common one involves the evidence of the lack of a weapon in the right hand, which normally bears a weapon. It is shown to be empty by its connectedness to the opposite person's hand.

Nowadays, of course, the handshake is an important tool in a first-time greeting situation. Many people say that a firm handshake is a significant aspect of a job interview, or other situation in which first impressions are important.

To Christians, the handshake has an additional meaning, one that expresses a bold theological statement, specifically when the shaking of hands takes place during worship. As hands are clasped, one person says, “the peace of the Lord (or Christ) be with you,” and the other replies, “And also with you.” The act is then repeated with others, with the intention of reflecting the peace that Christ brings us—a peace that is not just an absence of violence or a pause in conflict, but a profound new reality that envelops us as individuals and as a community, drawing us deep into the embrace of God, offering us healing, grace, and love.

BOARD OF GOVERNORS

They have also helped us with some cleaning up inside the church. We would like to thank this group of boys for their hard work and community service.

DIACONATE

Valerie Nevel opened our April meeting with readings from Romans and II Corinthians, focusing on the way Christians behave and treat one another.

We welcomed newly appointed deacons Barb Teeter and Ike and Linda Jacobs. We discussed Called to Care, the new confirmation class, communion,

the installation of new deacons, and the present distress in our congregation. We considered our role as deacons in restoring wholeness to our community.

We planned an all-day retreat for current and former deacons at the Meriden church on April 27, to work on spiritual growth, particularly our call to Grow Deeper.
