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The Pastoral Perspective

What does Church School mean to you? You possibly remember Sunday lessons of some sort, taught by older members of the congregation. Did you ever pause to reflect on how much work went into preparing those lessons? About the love and dedication that went into the work? Of how somebody might have been missing out on sermons or music they wanted to hear, just so you could have an instructor?

My Sunday School career was checkered, to say the least. I'm ashamed to say I was actually tossed from the classroom once. The baseball glove I brought probably communicated my profound indifference to what was going on. Yet here I am, all these years later, a minister with a deep gratitude for those who work in children's ministries.

I think of Tom and Ruthie in Concord, the ever-reliable, always-inspiring teachers of the fourth graders. Tom was a professor at Harvard Business School, but his love of those kids was remarkable. Year in and year out, decade after decade, he and his wife taught those children. I wanted to bring them here to Lebanon, but obviously I could not and so had to let go of them. Fortunately, when I arrived in the Upper Valley, I found someone just as good, just as committed: our own Marcia Corkins.

Marcia has capably and creatively led our Church School program for the entire time I've been here; she's now done so for twenty years. She has brought love and dedication to her work and for that I'm profoundly grateful, as both your pastor and a parent. But like all good things, this is now coming to an end. After many years of service, Marcia is stepping aside, handing over the reigns of our Church School to her successor, Nan Parsons, about whom I could also write many complimentary things. This moment of transition allows us to look at our Church School and see what we have done well, to see what we would like to do differently, to imagine drawing in more kids and having more of them attend worship on a weekly basis. Life is filled with choices. What might we do that would put church at the top of that list?

In short, we wonder about the future, our future. What does it portend? What will our Church School look like? What can it look like? In the

COMMITTEE NOTES

CHURCH COUNCIL

At Council in April Brian Clancy noted a very full **Music at the Meetinghouse** schedule during May and June. One special event is the debut of the Anonymous Coffeehouse on June 7, for which he has been working out logistical details with the organizer, Adam Sorscher. A call for musicians has attracted several good options, and a temporary stage platform will be constructed for the Parish Hall. Assuming that the June 7 event is successful, the Coffeehouse would eventually happen monthly.

For the **Diaconate**, Barb Jones reported on worship participation during Holy Week, the Deacons' involvement in campaign visioning, and other issues currently under consideration. She expressed her appreciation that Stacey Steele is now a covenant member, with full status as a deacon.

Corrine Erskine observed for **Mission and Social Action** that the shopping-cart initiative has been successful so far, and April has brought a collection of pet supplies and food for the Upper Valley Humane Society. We've also scheduled this year's visit by the Bike & Build group for June 15-17, which will again offer two dinners and a breakfast, along with a show by Valley Improv. This year's visit includes a Sunday morning, which presents the challenge of holding worship, church school, and coffee hour while also storing the group's belongings on their build day.

Jon Scott reports that the **campaign planning group** would be meeting

again in May in order to translate the discussions of April's visioning session into clear, actionable goals and consider a timeline forward. Jon also pointed out the need to coordinate campaign goals with regular stewardship and determine the pledge process for both.

For the **Board of Governors**, John Gilliatt reviewed plans for Sanctuary insulation projects. He clarified that the walls can be insulated but only by opening holes in the exterior siding for blowing in the insulation material, a costly process that would extensively alter the exterior of our historic building. It has also been determined that the Sanctuary's ceiling structure can accommodate the added load of insulation. In other areas, the Board is assessing the replacement of the front portico decking with a synthetic material (rather than wood). The Parsonage energy audit will hopefully be done soon, but if not it may have to wait until the fall. Our annual Spring Clean-up will be Saturday, June 8.

In his **pastor's report**, the Rev. Steve Silver looked back at Holy Week and thanked all those who had served in some way in worship services and other events. He also acknowledged the success of our recent campaign planning forum and distributed copies of the poster sheets of proposed target areas, which show fairly even support among all purposes. Relative to the goal of creation care, Valerie Nevel has explored the possibility of revising FCC's United Church Funds portfolio to minimize our investment in fossil-fuel interests.

Steve also reported on his recent trip to Cleveland for a productive meeting of the UCC's Historical Council, including a consultation with John Dorhauer about the denomination's newly developed set of foundational theological claims. This has been an important achievement, developed over two years and representing broad participation and consensus despite a diverse range of beliefs.

Looking ahead, Steve noted that Pentecost Sunday in June will mark the retirement of Marcia Corkins, to be observed with appropriate recognition and grateful celebration of her years leading the Church School. Steve plans to take study leave in May for a trip to New York for a program with distinguished theologian N. T. Wright. He is also making summer vacation plans, for which Jo Shelnett will provide pastoral coverage.

DIACONATE

Reporting to the Diaconate in April, Steve Silver noted that while participation in the Lenten Bible Study varied, discussion was good and more will be scheduled. He stated that Eliot Fay has completed his Clinical Pastoral Education process, with a paper of his thoughts on ordination to follow. Deacons supporting his candidacy were all encouraged to attend worship at his church in Newport. Steve has spoken with Jo Shelnuttt regarding summer preaching, likely for three weeks in July.

Our campaign planning session went well, with over 30 participants,

no lingering disagreements, and paper submissions now available for further analysis. A breadth of interests was supported but needs further consideration, including the feasible scale of commitments for given areas. Phil Hammond expressed an interest in youth programming, and it was noted that, in addition to resources, any initiative needs the commitment of someone to motivate it. Steve plans to update consultant Bob Barr on these steps.

Steve and the Deacons will revisit the creation of a new welcome brochure for the pews. The Deacons will reassess the Sanctuary sound system, liturgist training, and usher

oversight. Steve also noted plans for installation of a removable handrail to facilitate use of the altar stairs as needed.

Barb Jones and Steve will follow up with Brian Clancy to review our membership roster, to identify any members without even minimal recent engagement. Barb Teeter will share her knowledge of past engagement of long-time members. In a related note, Barb said that Ardell Mansfield had attended a centennial event at her childhood church in Lyndonville, VT.

The Deacons will also be discussing the possibility of a new meeting time, as some have conflicts on Monday nights.

What's WIC?

Getting to Know One of FCC's Regular Guests

For almost five years, First Congregational Church has hosted twice-monthly clinics of New Hampshire's Women, Infants, and Children Program—popularly known as WIC. Subject to certain income guidelines, families can obtain free health screenings, nutritional education and advice, breastfeeding support, and service referrals. (And despite the name, fathers routinely utilize WIC services, too!) An itinerant program with limited resources, WIC depends on sites across the state that offer enough space for its clinics at minimal cost.

Practicing responsible healthcare and nutrition can be challenging for any family, but without WIC's support it would be impossible for many parents with limited means, working multiple jobs. WIC offers them vital assistance, and they in turn are tremendously grateful. "Thanks to WIC," says a typical client, "my children's health is on track."

By offering this vital program the space it needs, our congregation extends the love and compassion that Christ asked us to share with each other.

The NH Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP)

In addition to operating WIC clinics in Grafton County, the Belknap-Merrimack Community Action Program manages CSFP, a free healthy-food program for qualifying seniors. This state-funded resource offers up to \$50 worth of food monthly to anyone aged 60 years or older who needs help in stretching their food budget.
