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The Pastoral Perspective

I'm writing this the day before the election. Yes, it's a bit late for the November newsletter, but rather than wait to comment on the results—which will inevitably leave some part of the population upset or worried about the future—I am writing this now, because there is nothing I can do about what will happen on Tuesday.

Remember this passage from Matthew's Gospel (it also appears in Luke) about God knowing what is going on with the birds?

²⁹Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground apart from your Father. ³⁰And even the hairs of your head are all counted. ³¹So do not be afraid; you are of more value than many sparrows. (*Matthew 10:29-31*)

The Gospel writer is clear here: nothing is beyond God's knowledge or awareness, and thus, there is nothing for us to worry about. This isn't fatalism, or surrendering to events, but simply a recognition that as out-of-control the world seems to be, it isn't.

Things may seem hectic, even a bit crazed at this moment, but we will persevere. All of us. We may not see ourselves as one community, but that's what we are. In fact, to use a cliched phrase, we are family.

And, yes, that's in the Bible too, in Mark, Matthew, and Luke. As long as we do the will of God, we are siblings of Jesus.

Being a sibling can be tough sometimes. We don't always treat each other well. We may not like one another. But as those of us who aren't only children know, we are stuck with one another. And when push comes to shove, the knowledge that we are not alone is a comfort. Add to that the knowledge that Jesus loves us, and we should be able to feel the comfort, the reassurance, the confidence that things will work out.

So, the results are in. You may be excited. You may be worried. We (and I use that word advisedly) are going to be okay. For, turning to Scripture once again, specifically Romans 8, "If God is for us, who can be against us?" Paul knew a lot about adversity, far more than any of us will endure, hopefully. His faith held firm. My prayer is that ours will, too.

NEWS AND NOTES

CHURCH COUNCIL

Ion Scott opened Council in October with a devotion from his great uncle. about the blind leading the blind, based on the Gospel of Matthew. In his pastor's report, Rev. Steve Silver noted the Grafton-Orange-Sullivan Association fall meeting on November 17 in Lyme, at which the Association's future is to be discussed and voted on, relative to conferencewide reconsiderations of this model of governance. Steve also remarked on a large family from Michigan who had attended worship. Though active in the Church of the Nazarene, the family wanted to visit a traditional Congregational service while traveling in the area, and all appreciated the family's presence.

Jon asked about our congregation's experience with the **Grafton-Orange Sullivan Association**. Steve replied that he couldn't think of any current members who had been involved with the Association, recalling only the late Carolin Bassett. Jon proposed we convene a short congregational discussion some Sunday following worship to raise our awareness and offer context for the November 17 meeting and vote.

Steve next mentioned the CROP Walk on October 13. Linda Jacobs reported that there would be food

served after the walk, which had fewer than 40 registered walkers. She and Corrine Erskine will check with organizer Rob Grabill regarding the provisions. Jon raised the question of why walk participation has declined so significantly over the years.

Steve commended Dawn Troutman and all those who helped provide the September Community Dinner, a huge success in reviving this monthly event. Dawn thanked Steve, looking forward to Council's leadership of the October meal. She further noted that her office (Susan Cole Realty) would organize November's dinner, an important step toward involving volunteers from outside our church. She invited others to consider groups they might ask to provide a dinner.

Jon next referred to a recent meeting of the **Finance Committee**, which, as Dawn and Valerie Nevel explained, reviewed current-year numbers and began to look at the 2025 budget. The meeting made a good start on the budget process.

Jon then offered a brief report on behalf of **Board of Governors** chair Walter Scott. One priority is repair of the Parsonage garage door, for which Walter has solicited estimates. Regarding the replacement of the church's front steps, the contractor has estimated \$12,000 for materials and \$4800 for labor, assuming that FCC volunteers can help remove the current steps. When complete, the steps will look much nicer and require virtually no maintenance, far more durable than the current painted wood and crumbling plaster. Jon hopes the work might be done later this fall if the weather allows. Valerie asked whether the contractor had included a typical markup and offered references; Jon replied that it's a discounted rate, and he himself has had very good experience with the contractor. Steve and Valerie both commended Walter for his work on this, which he must balance against his family and full-time job.

The Diaconate hadn't yet met in October month, and chair Linda Gerlach reported nothing notable in advance of its meeting, although she remarked that the group always has good discussions. Jon suggested that all nametags be reviewed and updated, with extras always on hand for visitors to worship.

For Mission and Social Action, Valerie again noted the CROP Walk and the shopping cart. The **Trustees** will meet with UCF representatives either October 29 or November 6, pending participants' availability.

Lastly, Jon reported that at the May 10 season finale of the **Anonymous**

Grafton-Orange-Sullivan Association Fall Meeting

NEWS AND NOTES

Coffeehouse, one of the musicians had used a considerable amount of obscenity in her set, performing (as all Coffeehouse musicians do) on the chancel in the Sanctuary. While he personally found that upsetting, his companion was so furious that they refuse to attend another Coffeehouse show. Ion raised the issue with Rev. Silver and the Church Administrator, asserting that our Sanctuary is first a place of worship, a sacred space there are limits to what's acceptable as artistic expression in that space. He asked that we raise this concern with Coffeehouse organizer Adam Sorscher and invited comments from others. Valerie observed the tension between free speech and obscenity, while Steve asserted that we have the right in this case to determine that certain speech should be prohibited. Linda Iacobs noted that this was the first instance of such language in five years of Coffeehouse shows, and all agreed at least that the performer in question should not be allowed to return. Based on her experience with the Coffeehouse over the years,

Linda volunteered to communicate Council's concerns to Adam. We can't fully control how all musicians express themselves, but Jon feels that Adam should be able to persuade them to respect this boundary.

DIACONATE

Bob Gerlach opened the Deacons' October meeting by sharing the joy of mysteries and puzzles, expressing thanks for curiosity that brings new insights. The group reviewed and updated several **congregational-care situations**, assessing the needs for further support and follow-up.

Deacons also asked about the status of the Diaconate welcome board and the new church directory. In a subsequent follow-up, the Church Administrator reported that the new digital directory had been distributed several times in August in the "This Week" emails, with updates to come periodically. The Diaconate board awaits final input and approval. The Deacons further noted several new

faces in the congregation and the need for access to blank name tags. The Church Administrator will soon evaluate the status of our nametag collection and supplies.

In his pastor's report, the Rev. Steve Silver emphasized the importance of congregational attendance and participation in the November 17 meeting of the **Grafton-Orange-Sullivan Association.** The meeting will determine the path forward as the NH Conference assesses the viability of the Association structure generally. Steve noted there would be a congregational discussion after worship on Sunday, October 20, to provide background.

Sue Pratt recommended we clarify the process for Deacons to secure ushers and Zoom greeters. The group also agreed that an in-person retraining session might be useful to highlight responsibilities as well as supplies. Steve plans to propose an ecumenical Thanksgiving service, for which he would like Deacons to assist with readings.
