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## The Pastoral Perspective

The attractive, hip couple was laughing as they got onto the subway car, apparently having a fun night out together, like generations of young people before them. They found seats, sat down, pulled out their mobile phones, put on their headphones, and slipped into their own private spheres. There on the F train from Coney Island to Manhattan, they were together yet strikingly alone.

Technology can be a wonderful tool, something that can enhance and enrich our lives. If you are like me, you use email and social media to stay in touch with family and friends across the country and maybe even around the world. You may have read a book or scanned the headlines while standing in an interminably long line. As cliché as it sounds, we live in an age of electronic miracles. Yet this boon has a dark side, one I was reminded of as I looked at those twenty-somethings: it can be all too easy for us to lose touch with, even shut out, the people and world around us in favor of our companions and experiences in cyberspace.

That said, the temptation to cut ourselves off from others does not depend simply on our Android devices or iPhones. Instead, it has bedeviled women and men from the very beginning. We need only think of Adam and Eve, ignoring God's one command and losing no time pointing the finger at others when they were caught out. We are able to isolate ourselves by indulging our resentments, nurturing grudges, ignoring our responsibilities to those who depend upon us, or declining to make ourselves vulnerable to those who seek to care for us.

The Christian church—with its witness about God as Trinity, as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, each unique but all One—teaches us about the mutuality that is at the heart of the universe, reflecting how our Creator intended those made in his image to live: in relationship, in love. As we begin a new program year, I pray that each of us will be blessed to encounter God's love in this gathered

## COMMITTEE NOTES

#### BOARD OF GOVERNORS

Meeting at the end of July, the Board of Governors discussed the funding and specifications involved in the kitchen water-heater proposal. Wendell Smith, after considering the smaller capacity of an electric system, recommended a propane unit instead; he believes the latter will be less expensive as well.

Wayne Braley recommended that we contract with Valley Floors for refinishing the Parish Hall floor, based on their estimate and their professional attitude. The project would likely take approximately 1-2 weeks. All agreed that it would be best to do this during the summer of next year, so as to minimize any inconvenience.

Brandon Mason noted extensive progress in completing a list of small projects around the church building and grounds, including the Sanctuary, Parish Hall, kitchen, and bathrooms. Nan Parsons added that the newly re-planted side garden was doing quite well, and she noted a couple other minor landscaping and exterior items.

The Board also reviewed its threeyear project plan, focusing on the Sanctuary painting job. Aside from the ceiling work done in 2013, it has apparently been at least 35 years since any painting was done in the Sanctuary, and the Board hopes to finish the project this winter.

#### CHURCH COUNCIL

For the **Board of Governors**, John Gilliatt reviewed a variety of repairs and improvements that the Board had completed in the previous few months, for which all expressed gratitude. John also summarized tasks still to be done, including some larger, more ambitious projects in the Sanctuary and around the building exterior.

Council discussed the substantial Sanctuary painting project, for which Don Collins has supplied an estimate of around \$57,000. Meant to cover most everything below the coving of the ceiling, the project would be subdivided into three phases-the balcony and loft spaces, the main central space, and the proscenium arch and altar area. Amy Driscoll wondered how the pews (which will not be included) would look afterward in comparison; she also raised the possibility of installing ceiling fans, an idea that many present supported.

Brian Clancy reported on **Henry Danaher's continuing efforts** to include new music and musicians in worship, strengthen the choir, and build FCC's reputation as a supportive environment for music. These efforts include tentative plans to create a designated space for instrumental practice in the church basement.

## COMMITTEE NOTES

While the **Nominating Committee** has been quiet, Amy Driscoll noted the need for more church-wide conversation and education about the most important offices and responsibilities in our governance. Chief among these priorities is financial management.

Adding her ideas about FCC's monthly **Community Dinner**, Amy suggested that the "regular" dinner organizers should perhaps work to recruit and raise awareness among the rest of the congregation about this important service responsibility. She also encouraged the church to be more intentional about kitchen safety and hygiene, with the ultimate goal of adopting best practices in a re-design of the kitchen's work space.

Marcia Corkins reported for **Christian Education** that the Musical Drama Camp had so far been a promising success, with all campers enjoying their experience. Everyone was looking forward to the performance and cookout on Friday. Kick-off Sunday will be September 18 this year, and the year's Church School theme is "Word Search: Exploring the Who, What, When, Where, Why, and How of the Bible."

For **Mission and Social Action**, Corrine Erskine noted that our work project with the Penobscot Nation in Maine had been postponed, primarily because of logistical challenges and the lack of essential preparations for the planned site work. Steve Silver added that the collaboration has still been a positive experience, as our members have helped identify the general requirements for such a project in the future.

In his pastor's report, Steve Silver reported positively on the worship exchange with West Lebanon Congregational Church. He also previewed September programs, particularly a special September 11 anniversary service featuring the Lamentations of Jeremiah by Thomas Tallis. Steve will be participating in the annual Wings of Hope event in Colburn Park on September 10; the choir will also sing at that event. Steve also reminded Council (as he has the Diaconate as well) that he would be eligible for sabbatical in February 2017.

On behalf of the **Trustees and** Finance Committee, Steve noted that Barry Schuster has made good progress reconciling the books. He also brought a proposal to increase the Church Administrator's job by four hours per month to include check-writing, bill-paying, and additional bank deposits-tasks which seem better suited to the centralized location of the office and more consistent and direct contact with our service providers. (Signing of checks would continue to be done by one of the church's designated volunteer officers who currently sign checks.) The proposal passed unanimously.
